- *a.* Roy Kinney PD *Reschedule at the next meeting*
- b. Don Reed- Utilities Don Reed brought two of his staff, Michael Dillion and Emily Peterson, to present on different topics. Don wanted to update the council of the Upland project at the river station. It has been completed with few problems, there is just a little clean up. Last week Don received a letter from the State of Colorado Dept. of public health and the EPA about the new lead and copper rules. These rules are the result of the problems in Flint Michigan. Basically what the rulings state is that the LCR rule has been revised. Currently Rangely is on a reduced schedule which means that we take 10 samples for lead and copper every three (3) years. This will no longer be our schedule, they are requiring that we access and expand our pool for lead and copper and classify each house which will be very time consuming. In addition to the homes assessment we must also assess the entire distribution system and target high risk entities for lead and copper contamination. Don must fill out page two of the report provided in the board packet with 10 item criteria, Don has until Sept 15. 2016 to complete the assessment and submit to the state for their approval. Don called Brian Pilgred from the State of Colorado to see if we could use the past ten people we had been using. Don was told there will be no considerations of reduced sampling going forwarð. This is going to be very hard in the fact that the personnel

completing these assessments must have a large amount of training to complete the testing correctly. Don feels that some of the problems is if he identifies a high risk home, if the home is high risk then the home owner at their own expense will have to repair their own home which will be very problematic. Andrew Shaffer asked if our responsibility doesn't stop at the curb stop. Don stated that with lead and copper we still must test but if a home is identified the home owner will be responsible for all costs. Joseph Nielsen said then the worst case scenario is that a very expensive repair could be a possibility. Joe feels that we must be very careful and be sure our testing is accurate and through. Joe asked if the home owner refuses the Town to enter their residence what can we do. Andrew Shaffer wants to make sure that the Utility department does public information so our community is well educated about the testing and why it is being done.

Michael Dillon updated the council on the cross connection we are currently sitting at 33% compliance with 64 customers surveyed, We need 53 more customers surveyed in order to meet the 50% survey ratio. Two dozen letters have been sent out that customers have not responded to. We need to start being a little more aggressive or we will fail to meet compliance by 2020. Mike is asking the council if he would apply for an alternate schedule which may help getting the compliance by 2020. Lisa Hatch asked how much the cost is to complete the cross connection. Michael said that for Chevron is was \$3000 but for most users it is around \$300. Michael would really prefer not to be intrusive if possible. The council is in agreement with Michael's recommendation. Emily presented the process that they have completing on Jar testing to explore best available technology. Coagulants remove particulate impurities, especially suspended solids and color from the water being treated. These contain microbes including pathogens. A jar test is a laboratory procedure where varying dosages of coagulant are tested in a series of glass or plastic jars under identical conditions. The jars are injected with coagulant dosages and mixed to match flash mix & flocculation field conditions as closely as possible. After mixing and settling the jars are observed to determine which dosage produce the largest, tightest floc or which dosage produces the floc that settles the fastest. Emily further explained that the reason for the switch was to avoid complacency. Use the best available technology to provide a safe, palatable product at the same or reduced cost to taxpayers. Health risks of Aluminum sulfate over a lifetime of ingestion. The reasons that we are using Ferric Chloride as the primary coagulant to benefit our consumers are softened water, more effective removal of color, turbidity, Higher removal of TOC's- indication of improved NOM and DBP removal (Trihalomethanes and halo acetic acid primarily), works over a wider pH range, produces a heavier floc that settles faster and is more effective during cold weather than aluminum sulfate, lower sludge disposal costs because high iron content sludge is not considered hazardous to the environment and is compatible and beneficial w/ many land application residual programs. It has also lowered cost of operations. Some of the health effects of higher exposure include: increased risk of developing bladder cancer. Other health effects that may be associated with exposure to DBPs include rectal and colon cancer. Adverse developmental and reproductive effects associated with exposure to DBPs during pregnancy are a concern. Some of the other water users that have switched to this technology are Brad Nelson of Weber Basin Water Conservancy- 14 years using Ferric, Dave Hatch of Ashley Valley Water and Sewer, Big Cottonwood Water Treatment Plant, Ogden

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Water Treatment. A few of the possible downsides are de-scaling of service lines due to corrosion as water treated w/ ferric combines with pre-existing organic material. We have investigated the possibility of having to add soda ash or lime to adjust pH values of finished product in instances of very low influent ph. Caveat to that is an increased softening effect. \*Brad Nelson of Weber Basin Water Conservancy District. In conclusion Emily stated that the water department feels that switching to Ferric Chloride as our primary coagulant will provide a higher quality product with far fewer possible health effects at the same or a decreased cost to the taxpayers of our community.

**11.** Reports from Officers – Town Manager Update - Peter said he believes that the new employee's to the Utilities department are great additions to our team in the Utility Department. We have been working on the budget for the last week and half, we will have our first budget work session on Aug 23. The severance and mineral lease distributions are now looking like they may not be as low as previously anticipated for 2016. Peter thinks they should be no more than 20% off in 2016 and in 2017 they will be likely down 50%. Our health insurance looks like it will only increase 3-4% in 2016-17. We are very happy with the health insurance and the projected increase in premiums. We should be in very good shape by the end of this year and will hopefully add to our reserves. We can't commit that in 2017. We have some capital projects that will carry into 2017, the municipal building remodel and phase III of the water treatment plant. In addition to the 5:30 budget work session, Better Cities will be in town and would like to meet. Possibly we could meet with them after the Town council meeting. Peggy Rector called to ask if Better Cities could meet with all of the special districts and the CNCC board so we can try to move the project forward. We still have a number of taxing entity board members that do not feel they have a good understanding of the project and scope of work. Lisa Hatch will help implement this meeting. These meetings will go on until everyone understands the process and why they would consider committing their funds to this project. Funds will be committed to this project over the next 15 years. Next week the asphalt contractor is coming into town to complete Hillcrest and some patching work around town. Our new website will be up and running we hope this week. For consistency, we would really like pictures all of the council members and a short bio to update on the Website. The tank is having a celebration on the 13<sup>th</sup> of August at the park. Lisa Hatch said the dinner is at 5:00 followed by a concert at the tank. AGNC will be having a meeting on August 17<sup>th</sup> in Meeker. This meeting should be very interesting and will discuss a couple of key ballot initiatives #75 and #78. Andy Key is our representative and Lisa Hatch is our alternate. One ballot initiative is asking for a \$350 million tax increase on tobacco. Some initiatives are to let voters cast their ballot regardless of party affiliations. Andy Key believes that we need to have information every week in the newspaper to try and get more information out to the public about these proposals. Peter said that in addition we can get some information in the Utility billing. Lisa Hatch also sent an email that we need each taxing entity to know about the Better Cities meeting. It would be much easier to talk to each board separately but if the taxing entities want to meet collectively that is an option.

#### **Investing in our Future**

The Town of Rangely, Rio Blanco County, and Better City LLC have been working together for the last eighteen months to develop, refine, and implement a strategy to attract private investment into the Town of Rangely and to create new, diversified opportunities for employment and economic prosperity. These efforts have culminated in the identification of a development opportunity that would create new options for housing in the community, particularly for students at CNCC. The housing component is critical because CNCC is currently near capacity for student housing, and in order to grow programs as part of its ongoing commitment to the Town of Rangely, the college needs additional capacity for new students. The retail component of the project is designed to meet two of the community's most expressed desires: a robust, full-service grocery store that eliminates the need for frequent trips to Vernal or Grand Junction, and a family/young adult entertainment venue such as bowling, arcade, skating rink, etc. Several potential sites have been identified within the Town, and, depending on which location is ultimately selected, river recreation rentals such as kayaks, rafts etc., as well as mountain bikes, could be added to help provide an additional source of revenue for the retail operator.

By joining these projects into one, each component will assist the entire development and will help create critical mass to ensure a successful outcome overall. In other words, the retail and entertainment options will help the college (as well as other local businesses) recruit and retain students and staff. In turn, the proximity of housing adjacent to the proposed retail and entertainment center will provide easy access to individuals that will patronize the retail store. By themselves, any one of these projects would struggle in a rural community like Rangely, but by joining together and sharing overhead and development costs, economic modeling has shown that these projects are feasible and sustainable through a public-private partnership.

A public-private partnership is an economic development tool utilized by communities across the country to help address impediments within communities where private investment is not readily flowing. The public-sector invests through responsible and well-vetted means to change the project dynamics sufficiently so that the project becomes attractive to a private-sector operator. The private sector operator takes on operational risk, and the public-sector benefits by adding assets and venues without paying for the entire cost. The details of this public-private partnership will be determined in the coming weeks and months, but the project stands as a great opportunity to inject private investment into the Town of Rangely. Individuals from Better City, the Town and the County are currently working with local taxing entities to discuss the details of the public-private partnership to ensure that the community is the ultimate beneficiary of the project.

All funds would flow through the RDA which would coordinate the land transaction, as well as secure professional architectural and engineering design work. The public investment in the land acquisition for the retail portion of the project would be paid back to the RDA from the developer through a subsequent transaction. The proceeds from the transaction would go to fill the remaining \$350k funding gap for the housing project. Any additional proceeds would be paid back to the housing authority fund.
