Oakley is a white woman and part Cherokee and is proud of her heritage. Oakley would like to address the comments by the Mayor In the March 30 Rio Blanco Herald Times there is an article by Jen Hill about the Meeting between the Dinosaur Mayor Blakely and Rangely Town Council. Oakley is offended and believes that Joe was insensitive about the Ute Tribe and their heritage. Rangely and Rio Blanco County have no jurisdiction about the Casino and its land request. Oakley says that she does not understand why there is a concern about the number of acres that the Ute Tribe has. Oakley said that she believes that the economic benefits of having the casino would be very beneficial to the Town of Rangely. Oakley said that where she lived previously was very dependent that an Oil company could provide to the Town, when another company took over the tank farm they did away with 1600 families lost their employment, and slowly all of the support businesses lost their jobs and work. The only thing that brought the community was the casinos. Rangely has many other benefits that possibly would encourage people who come to gamble, she believes that we need this to move other economic development to our communities and we need to help our neighbors in Dinosaur. Joe Nielsen said that he would like to have a personal conversation with Oakley and talk about the comments that were offensive to her. Oakley asked if any of the rest of the Town Council felt the same way as Mayor Nielsen. Lisa Hatch stated that the comments made were more in concern to what the land use does and acreage mean to the area. Ann Brady said she feels the casino would be an opportunity for the area*

Andy Key asked to present the Rangely OHV Adventure Rally draft and wanted the council to know they may be coming back to ask for funding for this event.

Jen Hill wanted to present Peter Brixius with an appreciation for his presentation to the Home School Children with an award for them stepping up and giving them an education about the judicial system.

Reports from Officers – Town Manager Update – Peter Brixius reported that last week a Meeker was met at Kilowatt Corner about the algae that is growing in the River, the bloom has changed course of the North fork drastically and the South Fork has gotten algae is very thick. This has been a problem for our water treatment plan as well. They believe it is a nutrient problem. The samplings have not revealed what the problems may be. Water temperature, things killing off the good bugs can all be the factors. It was a good discussion but no decisions came out of the discussion. Last Thursday the gas department sponsored a day of caring at the Trap Shoot club. Kelli worked on gas installation, Tyson Hacking brought a group from Williams that worked on numerous projects. Peter wanted to thank Kelli and Tyson. Tomorrow is anyone planning on attending the meeting on the upper white river flood plane? Lisa hatch will be attending and Andy Key will try. Peter asked if the council would be interested in supporting the bill being presented for the Parks & Wildlife sustainability that will increase the licensing fees in Colorado. Peter said Jeff Rector asked if the town council would write a letter of support on the bill. Joe asked what fees would be increasing. Peter said the fees are supposed to directly to be used to help with big game hunting and not go into the general fund. Andy Key said that Jeff said part of this has to do with the younger generation are not hunting and fishing anymore. Ann Brady said the draw rules are killing local hunting. Brad Casto feels the council should write a letter to game management rather than money management supporting the bill. Andy Key suggested to the commissioner should contact the legislature that they create a fee for in and out of state hunting. The consensus of the council was that they would like further review before authorizing a support letter, Peter said he will follow up with everyone later in the week. Peter said that our code enforcement employee Janet Miller has started this past week and has handled some particularly difficult problems already. Peter said that the one code enforcement issue that was brought up this past week by Trey has improved. Peter said that Janet handled the code problems this week very professionally. CDOT said that they have to do one more inspection before they can finish installation on the Wayfinding signs. The water treatment plant capitol project progressing as scheduled. There are some manholes that need to be rehabbed which will be partially funded through our grant, pond A is being drained down and having odorant

applied as needed to maintain the fumes. Peter reported that one more of the WRV apartments are being rehabbed. The ultrasonic examination has been completed on the Raw Water Tank, Stewart Welding repaired quite a few pin holes in the tank. The tank was filled up partially to see how the water holds. If no problems come up we will continue use through the end of the summer. In front of the council are the travel management plan and some of the meetings happening throughout the year. Alden VandenBrink provided a notice about the upcoming meeting of the advisory group concerning the 2017 Taylor Draw Dam and Kenney Reservoir 1982 memorandum of agreement

Report from Rangely District Hospital

January 1, 2014 through January 24, 2017 number of patients brought into the ER for three year period of Opioid related Emergency Department.

SB 13-014 Town Attorney Comments

Colorado revised Statute 18-1-712 Immunity for person who administers Narcan during an opioid drug overdose event

Recently in last four weeks responded to a Heroin OD. Arrived on scene and no information was given by those who was with the person. Officers had to make a decision based on what was seen at the location, needles, syringes and tin foil etc.

Ambulance arrived in about five minutes behind officers. Officers had enough time to update on person current condition, before making an informed decision if the person was having an Opioid OD event. This person was taken to ER and dispensed Narcan three times. Do know after this person was flown to GJ if they received follow up information on Opioid Counseling and behavioral therapies services.

Who decides if the officer acted in good faith?

Who in this community is doing the education (Licensed to prescribe?)



RANGELY POLICE DEPARTMENT

Dispensers are strongly encouraged to educate before dispensing on risk factors of Drug Overdoses.

After receiving training are we Law Enforcement still held to the same standard as a lay person?

Cost- 75.00 per dose

Kept at room temperature (not too hot and not too cold) expires in about two years

A person having an event has to have a heart beat and or be breathing to be given Narcan. It will only work after entering the blood and circulated through the body.

2) **Mechanism of overdose:** when someone dies it's because their breathing slows to the point where they stop getting enough oxygen to stay conscious, and without air, eventually the heart stops. With an upper overdose, the heart stops, or person has seizures or stroke.

3) Risk Factors:

- a) Mixing: opioids with alcohol/pills, or cocaine →→ *Prevention*: don't use more than one drug at a time, don't mix highest risk ones.
- b) Tolerance: exiting jail, hospital, detox, esp. methadone detox →→ *Prevention*: use less after exiting jail, hospital, detox
- c) Quality: unpredictable →→ *Prevention*: tester shots.
- d) Using Alone: behind closed, locked door, where cannot be found →→ *Prevention*: don't use alone. Leave door unlocked. Let someone know where you are beforehand.
- e) Health: liver, breathing problems (asthma), compromised immune system, active infections, lack of sleep, dehydration, malnourishment all increase risk of OD →→ eat, drink, sleep, see doctor, carry inhaler, treat infections, etc.

4) **Recognizing an overdose:** The line between high vs. overdosing: **unresponsive**. Other signs to look for: slow, shallow breathing, pale, blue, snoring/gurgling for opiate OD; chest pains, difficulty breathing, dizziness, foaming at the mouth, lots of sweat or NO sweat, racing pulse, puking, seizures, loss of consciousness for stimulant OD.

5) Checking for a response (downer/opiate OD):

- a) Noise: call name, yell "cops"
- b) Pain: shake, slap, sternum rub.
- c) Airway: head tilt, chin lift.
- d) Check breathing and clear airway (check for syringe caps, undissolved pills, cheeked Fentanyl patches, toothpicks, gum, etc.)

6) **Recovery Position:** put person on their side if you have to leave them alone to call 911.

7) Calling 911:

- a) Say: (location), "someone is unconscious, not breathing." Not: "overdose."
- b) Naloxone only works on opiates, not benzos or alcohol. Need 911 as backup.

8) Rescue Breathing

- a) If you're alone with the overdosing person, start rescue breathing and then go get naloxone after you've given a few breaths. If you're not alone, start rescue breathing while other person goes to get the naloxone.
- b) Head tilt, chin lift
- c) Look, listen, feel: to see if chest rises/falls; listen/feel for breath.
- d) Two breaths: normal sized, not quick, not a hurricane!
- e) One breath every five seconds (count one-one thousand, two-one thousand...)
- f) Explain need: brain damage/death after 3-5 min. without oxygen to brain, ambulance may take longer, have to breathe for person until naloxone kicks in or paramedics arrive.

10) Administering Intramuscular Naloxone

- a) Assembling shot: remove cap on vial, draw up 1cc of naloxone into muscling syringe.
- b) Site location: arm (deltoid), thigh, butt. Shoot into muscle, not vein, not abscess.
- c) Administering shot: clean with alcohol wipe (if available). Insert at 90° angle. Push in plunger.

Administering Nasal Naloxone

- a) Pull off yellow caps, screw spray device onto syringe
- b) Pull red cap of the vial of naloxone and gently screw into bottom of syringe
- c) Spray half of vial up one nostril, half up the other

11) While you're waiting for the naloxone to kick in...

- a) Start rescue breathing again, until you see the person start to breathe on their own.
- b) Wait 2-3 minutes (it seems like forever!) until you give a second dose of naloxone. Give it a chance to work; it doesn't always work instantaneously.
- c) If you get no response after 2-3 minutes, give a second dose and start rescue breathing again. If there is still no response, continue breathing until paramedics arrive and let them take over, and if you haven't called 911 yet, do it now! There could be something else wrong, they may have taken different drugs that naloxone doesn't work on, or it could be too late for naloxone to work.

10) Aftercare:

- a) Takes several minutes to kick in; wears off in 30-45 minutes
- b) Person won't remember overdosing; explain what happened
- c) Don't allow the person to do more opioids--could OD again
- d) Need to watch person for at least an hour
- e) Could need to administer another dose of naloxone

11) Naloxone kit care:

- a) Keep out of sunlight, and keep at room temperature (not too hot, not too cold—don't put the kit in the fridge!)
- b) Expires in about two years—date will be on your Naloxone itself.

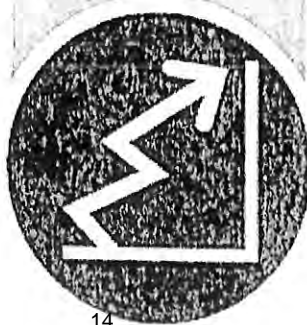

Peter:

My overall impression: No upside for our officers to be involved, and big potential for big downsides if a drug user dies or is permanently rendered brainless, a technical term. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] That is a bit overstated, but until judges rule on wrongful death cases over the years to come, we just won't know.....

SB 13-014: FIRST SECTION. New CRS section 18-1-712.

1. Limits criminal prosecution if person 'acts in good faith' [so, if the prosecutor believes it was not in good faith, charges will still be filed] if 'the person believes' [objective or subjective standard? That is, if I really believe the drug user was overdosing, but I was wrong, does 'believe' cover me? Probably, but not certain.]
2. Weird: Those who are licensed to prescribe are 'strongly encouraged to educate the drug users before hand. That is just stupid: How do you reach the drug users before hand, before they OD?
3. "Dispensers," which would be officers are 'strongly encouraged' [read: mandated!] to "educate" the drug user before dispensing. Again, how stupid: The drug user is frothing at the mouth, or not conscious, and the officer is supposed to 'educate' them? The statute even defines the "event" to be where the drug user is not conscious or isn't breathing! Perfect time to have an educational moment, eh?
4. Also, "dispensers" are 'strongly encourage' to "educate" the drug user about "risk factors for overdose, recognition of overdose, rescue breathing and administrative of an opiate antagonist." While the statute doesn't say it, you can bet that the 'strongly encouraged' means the same, to a plaintiff's lawyer suing for a drug overdose death, as a standard of care that a volunteer will be held to meet. What the statute says right afterwards is: This section does not create any duty/standard of care when dispensing, but my experience is that, in fact, if anything goes wrong, the officer will be subject to a criminal prosecution. It all depends on the prosecutor. Not much comfort for the 'volunteer.'
5. More proof that this is a slippery slope, despite the Legislative purpose statement is the part of the statute that says that the drug overdose 'event' is one that "a layperson would reasonably believe to be an overdose situation that requires medical care." Here my concern is that if the officers actually get the 'strongly recommended' training, they are no longer a 'layperson.' That is what I would argue if I were the plaintiff's lawyer.

SECOND SECTION. New statute: 13-21-108.7.

1. Similar to the criminal section, above: Says the officer must 'act in good faith', must believe the drug user is having an 'event', and if they administer the Narcan, shall not be civilly liable. So, again, the officer will be judged based on Monday morning, and what s/he should have known, and should have done.
2. If the Legislature said instead that a person administering the Narcan was completely immune from criminal and civil liability until proven to have acted willfully or wantonly or recklessly, I would feel much better. Until that standard is in place, if I were in that situation, I would be very skittish to giving the drug for fear that I gave too much, I misdiagnosed the situation, etc.

asked Roy how likely that would be and he thought carrying the \$75.00 kit around in the patrol car would make it difficult to maintain the temperature. If the person is not breathing, has high blood pressure, is nursing, etc.. not supposed to administer. It also covers a narrow band of substances that it will be useful for as an antidote which include heroin and probably some of its synthetic derivatives.

Subject: NARCAN - Update

We're taking a deeper look at NARCAN and hope to have all of the details of this opiate antagonist, Naloxone, available to present. Looking at cost, storage, training, administering, EMS normal response times, liabilities if any, etc.... There are side effects and they can be significant.

S.B. 13-014 provides criminal and civil immunity for ***"a person other than a health care provider or a health care facility who acts in good faith to administer an opiate antagonist to another person whom the person believes to be suffering an opiate-related drug overdose event"***.

Provides criminal and civil immunity to ***"a person who is permitted by law to prescribe or dispense an opiate antagonist for such prescribing or dispensing, and any outcome and any outcome resulting from the eventual administration of the opiate antagonist. States that no standard of care is created. Encourages prescribers and dispensers to educate persons receiving the opiate antagonist on a number of items."***

Between the cost, side effects, storage issues related to temperature and the possible implication of our officers in a wrongful death charge which will in almost every case have no teeth as a result of SB 13-014, there are a few considerations.. Ron said he looked up how many agencies had signed on to NARCAN. The list he had was 16 out of 256 agencies, but this listing was not accurate because Meeker was not on the list and we know they participate.

The final consideration is this; by the time our officer has the scene under control and has properly evaluated the person using, EMS will have most likely arrived or will be arriving in the next few minutes.

There are 2 bills related to Naloxone, one passed in 2013 and another bill in 2015 expanding the use of Naloxone. Person administering Naloxone and to the best of their ability should assess risk factors which could include;

Narcan (naloxone) is an opioid antagonist used for the complete or partial reversal of opioid overdose, including respiratory depression. Narcan is also used for diagnosis of suspected or known acute opioid overdose and also for blood pressure support in septic shock. Narcan is available in generic form. Common side effects of Narcan and narcotic drug withdrawal are:

- flushing,
- dizziness,
- tiredness,
- weakness,
- nervousness,



Parks And Wildlife Financial Sustainability

Concerning the parks and wildlife commission's authority to set certain charges assessed on people engaging in activities regulated by the division of parks and wildlife, and, in connection therewith, setting certain hunting, fishing, parks, and recreation fees and fines, creating an aquatic nuisance species sticker and associated fee structure, and requiring reporting by the division of parks and wildlife on fee amounts and the use of division-managed lands by nonconsumptive users.

2017 Regular Session

Subject:

Natural Resources & Environment

Section 1 of the bill provides a nonstatutory legislative declaration.

Section 2 adds 'voucher' and 'preference point' to the documents listed under the definition of 'license'.

Sections 3 and 17 add 'sponsorships' and 'donations' to the list of money transfers that the parks and wildlife commission (commission) is authorized to receive and expend.

Section 4 prohibits the commission from using revenue generated from increased license fee amounts authorized by the bill for the purchase of any fee title interest in real property or any interest in water.

Section 6 clarifies that the Colorado outdoor recreation search and rescue card fee is nonrefundable.

Sections 7, 14, 15, and 18 raise the maximum fee amounts that the commission may assess by rule for certain licenses, permits, and passes. Sections 7, 14, 15, and 18 also authorize the commission to apply a consumer price index adjustment to a fee that has been set at the maximum fee amount allowed, which fee adjustment does not count toward the maximum fee amounts set.

Section 8 allows the division of parks and wildlife (division) to grant up to 25% of the money derived from sales of the state migratory waterfowl stamp to nonprofit organizations implementing the North American waterfowl management plan.

Section 9 removes references to the fee assessed for the youth small game hunting license since the maximum fee amount for the license is listed in another part of statute. Section 9 also authorizes the commission to establish by rule a special licensing program for young adult hunters and anglers and requires that, if the commission establishes such a licensing program by rule, the commission must define 'young adult' in a manner that does not include adults 26 years of age or older.

Section 10 changes the name of the wildlife management public education advisory council to the wildlife council.

Section 11 requires the division to prepare reports on the status of certain license fee increases that the commission is authorized to promulgate pursuant to the bill and nonconsumptive users' use of division-managed land, and to present the reports to the agriculture committees in the house of representatives and the senate.

Section 12 increases the fine imposed against a person who violates a wildlife statute or rule that does not have a specific penalty listed for the violation from \$50 to \$100.

Section 13 raises the penalty for a number of wildlife-license-related offenses to an amount equal to twice the cost of the most expensive license for the species. Section 13 also clarifies that engaging in conduct that requires a license without a license is a violation subject to an assessment of 10 license suspension points and a fine amount equal to twice the cost of the most expensive

license issued for the activity that the person unlawfully engaged in without the requisite license; except that a violation based on fishing without a license is subject to a \$125 fine and an assessment of 10 license suspension points.

Section 23 requires a person to purchase an aquatic nuisance species sticker to operate or use a vessel on the waters of the state or possess a vessel at a vessel staging area. The fees collected on the sale of aquatic nuisance species stickers are credited to the division of parks and wildlife aquatic nuisance species fund to help fund inspections of vessels and associated conveyances for the presence of aquatic nuisance species, decontamination of vessels or conveyances with the presence of aquatic nuisance species, lake monitoring for the presence of aquatic nuisance species, and outreach efforts.

Under current law, 'pass' or 'registration' is defined as a document issued by the division authorizing the use of land or water under the division's control. **Section 16** adds 'sticker' to the definition to encompass the aquatic nuisance species sticker created in section 23.

Section 19 establishes that a violation of the requirement to obtain an aquatic nuisance species sticker is a class 2 petty offense, punishable by a fine equal to twice the cost of a nonresident motorboat or sailboat aquatic nuisance species sticker.

Section 20 repeals the division of wildlife aquatic nuisance species fund and renames the division of parks and outdoor recreation aquatic nuisance species fund as the division of parks and wildlife aquatic nuisance species fund, combining the 2 existing funds into one fund. **Sections 5 and 26** make conforming amendments regarding the combining of the 2 funds into one renamed fund.

Section 21 removes the \$5 cap on the fee that the division may charge a person for replacement of a lost or destroyed pass or registration. The fee is set at 50% of the cost of the original pass or registration.

Section 22 defines 'nonmotorboat'.

Section 24 changes the penalty for a violation of statutes and rules concerning parks and recreation for which a specific penalty is not listed from a class 2 petty offense to a misdemeanor and raises the fine from \$50 to \$100.

Section 25 establishes that engaging in conduct that requires a permit, pass, or sticker issued by the division without a permit, pass, or sticker is a violation subject to a fine amount equal to twice the cost of the most expensive permit, pass, or sticker issued for the activity that the person unlawfully engaged in without the requisite permit, pass, or sticker.

Rio Blanco County would like to lend our support for the proposed legislation found in House Bill 17-1321. The Colorado Parks and Wildlife Financial Sustainability legislation is one solution to appropriately fund needed programs, promote and preserve outdoor recreation offerings in Colorado, and ensure drastic financial cuts are not an imminent threat to CPW.

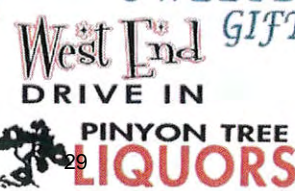
