White River Village has been awarded a very generous grant from Colorado Garden Foundation for installation of raised garden beds at the facility. Janet Miller and Jocelyn Mullin will travel to Denver and attend the awards ceremony and accept the grant on behalf of the Town of Rangely, during the 2023 Colorado Garden and Home Show.

Colorado Garden Foundation awards grants to organizations and scholarships to individuals throughout the state of Colorado. In the past 64 years, organizations throughout Colorado have received grants totaling more than \$12 million from Colorado Garden Foundation, a not-for-profit corporation dedicated to furthering the horticultural industry.

Each year, money raised from the Colorado Garden & Home Show and the Colorado Fall Home Show supports horticultural and related activities throughout Colorado. The Grant program funds tree and plant material purchases, school landscape improvements, healing and community



gardens, and educational and research programs with organizations throughout Colorado, while scholarships fund college students that are studying horticultural science and business, nursery management, turf grass management, landscape design or landscape management. Shortly after the New Year, McKenzie Webber resigned from the Foundation Board. The Hospital Board of Directors, Foundation Board and hospital as a whole would like to thank McKenzie for her time spent as the Foundation President. We wish her the best as she pursues new opportunities in her service and career. We would like to welcome Keely Ellis as a new board member which was unanimously voted on last December. At the next board meeting, we will select a new president, set strategic goals, and list out our priorities for 2023 and beyond. We have a vacancy on the foundation board if anyone is interested in joining. The foundation has raised around \$182,000 since its inception in 2020 most of which has come through grants.



It's an election year for the Hospital Board with three seats available. The surgery suite construction project continues to move forward. The projected construction timeline will be from May 1st to October 10th. Corelli will be converting a couple of the in-patient rooms to provide negative pressure, which will help with infectious disease and will also be doing some prep work for our new 128-slice CT scanner prior to the 1st. We used a SHIP grant to cover the cost of the negative pressure rooms and COVID funds for the new CT scanner, patient lifts, call light system updates and EMS equipment.

I'm excited to announce that we have purchased a van for our residents at Eagle Crest. Our residents have limited access to a vehicle for appointments and community events. The Rangely Rambler does a great job in transporting them when they need to but doesn't operate all the time. We have had employees for years use their own vehicles to transport our Eagle Crest residents across the street for appointments. Purchasing a van will help transport these patients to appointments or activities within the community. We purchased the van through Mobility of Denver, a company that converts cargo vans into a vehicle able to transport wheelchairs.

I had the opportunity to share the hospital's strategic plan with residents at White River Village. It was really great to see them and listen to their feedback. A lot of their concerns related to the lack of specialty services we have here at the hospital. Part of our strategic plan is to continue to grow our specialty service line in order to serve our community. Currently, we have Dr. Andrew Morse DO general surgeon from Community, Dr. Frank Laws Cardiologist from Glenwood Springs, and Dr. Gusumaneli for behavioral health. We will continue to look for other opportunities to expand in Optometry, Dermatology, and OBGYN in the future.

In closing, we recently promoted Dustin Coleman to our Facilities Director. Dustin has been in maintenance for the last 6 years and brings a lot to the table. I'm excited about his advancement. Be sure to check out our new website for other job postings. We strive to be the employer of choice. 2022 brought on some interesting challenges, but we have successfully

navigated through those obstacles and appreciate the communities support. We are looking forward to a great year in 2023.

Colorado Town is Getting Noticed for the Old Water Tank

A Colorado town along the Dinosaur Diamond Scenic Byway has long been known for great golfing, hunting, fishing, a community college, and an automobile and motorcycle museum. This town of about 2300 is now drawing tourism for an old water tank that offers something new in the world of sound.

The town is Rangely, Colorado about 300 miles west of Fort Collins. The old water tank has evolved into The TANK Center for the Sonic Arts. The tank built around 1940 as part of a former railroad water treatment facility, was never actually filled with anything.

The area around the tank has the proper slope to create acoustic resonance and has become a perfect concert venue. Rangely can now add super unique concert experiences and a recording studio like none other to their list of attractions.



Turns out it's not just the empty tank that makes for great sound. "The bed of gravel upon which the tank was placed bowed its



floor into a gentle parabola, giving it an extraordinary internal acoustical resonance" states The Tank.

There has been national recognition of the rarity of

sounds The Tank allows. The Tank Center for the Sonic Arts shares the following:

Writing in the New Yorker after witnessing a performance in The Tank, Alex Ross was ecstatic. "In my experience," he wrote, "music has never seemed closer to nature." The Los Angeles Times covered the place in detail. "Forget Carnegie Hall. Musicians rush to rural Colorado to play The Tank" was the headline. "One road to the musical future," wrote Alex Ross, "now runs through Rangely."

The special aspects of the sound in The Tank were discovered in 1976 and remained a secret among a few privy artists and musicians. In 2013 there was talk of the owner selling The Tank for scrap. The space

was saved thanks to some Kickstarter campaigns. Soon after, events and visitors started to fill the space regularly. Colorado band the Flobots made a visit in 2015. The success of The Tank has been continual.

Natural Gas January Billing and Cost

The Town of Rangely realizes that inflation has taken its toll on individuals and families as well as small businesses. Several factors have contributed to the increase in utilities (electric, gas and other forms of heat). These unforeseen factors include weather, supply issues, increased costs to the utility companies as well as the war in the Ukraine. These factors helped create extreme volatility in the natural gas market. Because of this, gas billing for January (bill received in February) is higher than normal. We have taken steps so that February and March billings (March and April bills) will be in line with gas pricing prior to January of this year.

February of 2021 when we had a large price increase, the Town took steps to prevent a





repeat of the increased costs. The Town adjusted the way we purchase gas at market price. Unfortunately, the circumstances from 2021 are totally different than what we experienced in January of 2023.

The Town has not and will not increase the fee we collect to operate the system even though our costs have risen. The only increase in your bill will be the actual cost of transporting and purchasing the natural gas for our customers. The Town of Rangely has done everything in our power to mitigate these costs and will continue to do so. The Town of Rangely also waived our normal fee so all that we are collecting is to pay the cost of the Gas and Transportation that we will be billed.

One of the things the Town does is to pre-purchase certain quantities of natural gas as much as three years in advance. The good news is that we have pre-purchased gas through March of 2023. We also recently added to our pre-purchased gas for February and March of 2023 to help mitigate these costs even more.

We believe that the Town of Rangely Gas rates are coming in lower than other gas utilities in surrounding communities. Rest assured that the Town will work with our customers as needed through this Winter as we did in February of 2021 when the weather in Texas caused a severe spike in prices. Again, we want to assure our customers that the Town is doing everything in its power to reduce the impact of these increases on our customers.

Things You Flush and Why They Matter

Occasionally, the Town of Rangely will have a backup in one of our sewer mains. Typically, these backups are caused by the accumulation of non-decomposing objects (such as rags and wipes) clinging onto roots protruding from service laterals. Even after jetting these lines and clearing the roots, the roots can grow back rather quickly and begin trapping objects as they flow downstream.

Having said that, backups aren't the only issue we face in the wastewater industry.

Flushing down certain chemicals and liquids into the sewer system can be detrimental to the process at the Wastewater Treatment plant by killing the microorganisms we rely on to treat the raw sewage. Not to mention, things like pharmaceuticals can make their way to our river and affect wildlife.



Here are a few things we ask you to refrain from introducing to the sewers:

- Baby Wipes, Flushable Wipes (Anything's "flushable" if it'll fit, but that doesn't mean you should!)
- Rags/Towels/ Cloth of any kind
- Feminine Hygiene Products
- Condoms
- Fats, Oils, or Grease
- Trash
- Needles
- Toys

A great deal of the time smaller departments can not afford to send their handlers to training and certification. They offen train alone, and don't have resources to rely on. HDPK9A has instructors and trainers willing to travel to instruct these K9 teams at no cost to the handler or department. HDPK9A covers these expenses. The training and certifications helps the K9 teams meet if not exceed the national standards set forth by court cases, and nationally recognized associations. HDPK9A also offers funds to assist handlers with medical expenses incurred after their K9 partners retire from service. Veterinarian care can be expensive, none of which is covered by the agencies the K9's worked for.

CRF Equine Services

CRF Equine Services is expanding and opening Coyote Run Saddle Shop! Located at 101 S. White Ave. in Rangely, the

store front will be home to the CRF Equine Services Remote Foaling Watch office and the new Coyote Run Saddle Shop.

CRF was founded in Rangely by Chloe Grogg in 2020. The letters CRF stand for Coyote Run Farm, a name I coined for my parents farm as a kid. I originally started the business under the name CRF Horsemanship, as lessons and training were my focus. I changed the name to CRF Equine Services in 2021 to broaden the spectrum and include the new service that would soon help horse breeders across the country get their much-needed sleep during foaling season.

An opportunity arose for me to start something new with the business in late 2020; remote foaling watch. I grew up working on thoroughbred farms in Pennsylvania and continued to do so into my twenties, but that all came to a halt when I moved to Colorado in 2020 to pursue



some of my training goals. When a friend mentioned that she was looking for foaling watch help on her farm, I jumped on the opportunity to be involved in thoroughbred breeding again; but warned I was only able to do so from Rangely. To my delight, this wasn't a problem. I started remote foaling watch for two farms in 2021, both around two-thousand miles away from Rangely.

Diamond B Farm (Mohrsville, Pennsylvania), and Saratoga Glen Farm (Schuylerville, New York) were the original farms to support and help bring remote foaling watch to life. The following 2022 season, I started offering remote foaling watch services to the public and great interest and feedback were received. The 2022 season ended in June with a total of 128 foals born on ten farms under the watch of CRF Equine Services. The current season is a busy one, with a staggering 294 mares on 16 farms booked and due to foal from January to June. Farms that use CRF Equine Services Remote Foaling Watch reside in eleven states; ranging from Idaho- all the way to Florida. We are the first, and currently only, business in the equine breeding industry worldwide to offer remote foaling watch services provided by trained professionals.

I decided to move the business from a home office to a brick-and-mortar office as hiring plans began to be put into place with the upcoming rush of foals. It just so happens that the office space has a store front with it! It is the perfect spot for a saddle shop, something that I saw a need for in Rangely as a horsewoman myself.

Coyote Run Saddle Shop will have handmade gear and tack available for purchase from local makers, along with services such as saddle repair, cleaning, oiling, and other custom requests.

The grand opening of the shop is scheduled for March 2nd, with an entry to a prize drawing for every visitor to the store.
