First, I would like to give thanks to our board members for their service, providers who provide excellent care, administration, and dedicated employees. Second, I'll give an update on a new service line for cardiopulmonary rehab. Finally, a brief update on the surgery construction project.

We have a great Board of Directors who dedicate their time each month to board meetings and spend hours reviewing the board packet and budget. They have a diverse background. This makes my job tough, but the reality is it creates an environment for great discussions and an opportunity to evaluate what is best for our community. We have great providers that care about you and your family. Dr. Tyler Morwood is the Chief of Staff. He came to Rangely a few years ago with Kaitlyn, his wife, right out of residency, and I tasked him with a lot of responsibilities. He took on those responsibilities and continues to grow in his role. I appreciate his commitment to RDH. Dr. Tyson Torgersen came a year later and added strength to our provider base. He also came out of residency with a lot of experience. Kelsey Riggio PA, Vivian Dillon NP, and Laramie Chandler NP round out the clinic provider staff. Dr. Krueger, Dr. Daniel, Dr. Sutton, and Dr Hsu rotate for ER coverage. All are dedicated to providing high-quality care for the community. Walk-ins are welcome from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Appointments can be scheduled by calling the clinic at 970-675-2237.

We will be having an open house late in January for a couple of our new service lines. Cardiopulmonary rehabilitation will open on December 6, 2023. I'm excited for this to happen. I would like to thank the Respiratory Department for their diligence in setting up the program. Rob Satterly was instrumental in creating the policies and heading up the project. I appreciate Zach McCormick, Respiratory Director, and Doug Dillon's support with the program as well. The surgery suite is on track to be completed in the first part of January. We have been teaming up with Community Hospital and Dr. Andrew Morse. They have been awesome in their support of our staff. We will release the dates soon for the open house. # CNCC to Offer Bachelor's Degree in Dental Hygiene

This January Colorado Northwestern Community College (CNCC) will begin offering a Bachelors of Applied Science (BAS) in Dental Hygiene. The BAS in Dental Hygiene is the first ever bachelor's degree being offered at CNCC which historically has focused on career and technical education programing, two-year associate degrees, and two-year transfer programs.

"This is Colorado Northwestern's first ever Bachelor's Degree, coming from its most historic program. Dental Hygiene has been a part of CNCC's programming since the 1960's and the department is considered one of the best in the nation. This new, 4-year degree is a tribute to the history and excellence of the Dental Hygiene program at our college." said Keith Peterson, Vice President of Instruction.

The announcement of the BAS in Dental Hygiene is the culmination or several years of hard work by CNCC's Dental Hygiene Department. They have worked closely with students, and industry leaders, to ensure the program meets the needs of the students and changes happening within the dental hygiene field.

"Industry standards are starting to move to bachelors as entry-level hygienist. The CNCC BAS program will allow graduates a greater scope and more opportunities in the dental world." said Tiffany Douglas, Dental Hygiene Program Director.

CNCC received final sign-off on the program by its accrediting body, the Higher Learning Commission (HLC), this fall following and intensive review process this past spring where HLC representative met with program faculty and staff to assess plans and program rigor.

"For me, the approval provided to offer the BAS is just one additional example of the quality of our program and the respect it has in the industry." said Lisa Jones, President of Colorado Northwestern Community College.

On the recommendations of HLC, Lisa Westhoff was hired as the Program Coordinator and lead Instructor over the summer to manage and put the final pieces in place for the spring launch. In that process she has worked hard to make sure the courses meet the modern needs and emerging trends in this ever-changing industry.

Lisa Westhoff, Program Coordinator and Lead Instructor said, "What sets this program apart is its unique blend of business and healthcare courses, offering dental hygienists a diverse range of career opportunities beyond clinical practice. Designed with working professionals in mind, this asynchronous online degree allows hygienists to continue their careers while expanding their horizons in leadership, education, research, and more, ultimately supporting their pivotal role in breaking down healthcare barriers."

The Dental Hygiene program will begin with a soft launch of the BAS program in the Spring 2024 semester with a limited number of students. The full launch of the BAS in Dental Hygiene will occur in the fall of 2024. The program will consist of nine 8-week courses taught over three semesters with the third semester culminating with a capstone project. To enroll students must have completed an associate's degree in Dental Hygiene from a CODA accredited institution.

#### Regional Meat Sector Feasibility Study Presented at NW Colorado Meat Sector Meeting

(Northwest Colorado) Colorado State University Extension (CSU), Northwest Colorado Development Council (NWCDC), and Community Agriculture Alliance (CAA) will host a regional NW Colorado Meat Sector Meeting on Friday, November 10th at 1:00 pm in the conference room at CNCC Craig Campus, 2801 W. 9th St. Craig, CO 81625.

The regional meeting will look at how to grow the food ecosystem in Northwest Colorado to diversify the regional economy in light of the sunsetting of coal. The Just Transition Fund (JTF), a national philanthropic initiative that supports coal-impacted communities, awarded CAA a \$25,000 grant to conduct a regional meat feasibility study in partnership with CSU and NWCDC. At the meeting, CSU will present the findings of the feasibility study that identifies the barriers that limit the growth of the agricultural sector in Moffat, Rio Blanco, and Routt Counties.

"The Just Transition Fund was very pleased to support this feasibility study, the results of which will equip the Northwest Colorado Development Council and its community partners to apply for federal funding," said Heidi Binko, the Just Transition Fund's executive director and co-founder. "Communities and organizations have unprecedented opportunities to leverage federal funding, but there are barriers to access. This is why the JTF launched its Federal Access Center to provide financial and technical support to remove some of these barriers."

The study reports what we heard in interviews with ranchers and consumers to business owners and policymakers to enact change and create a food ecosystem that supports more value-added agricultural and food processing activities. Value-added activities involve further processing or packaging raw agricultural products to help earn more money for family farms. For example, ranchers can package beef and sell directly to consumers or further process it into jerky or sausage.

"Agriculture in large part has shaped how Northwest Colorado was settled, and we love and appreciate the rural landscape we have today," said Tim Redmond, NWCDC Chair and Routt County Commissioner. "However, times change, and agriculture changes with it. The meat sector feasibility study we have in front of us today, helps us see what opportunities and innovations ag producers are seeking. This study can help align resources and people for the future ag landscape in Colorado."

The feasibility study was used by CAA to support the expansion of its new retail store in downtown Steamboat Springs. CAA purchased a building to enlarge the local food market, freezer and cooler storage, and organizational offices. Plans and new fundraising efforts are underway to provide

## Partnership with Town of Dinosaur

The Rangely Police Department is excited to announce a new partnership with the Town of Dinosaur! Starting January 1st, 2024, the Rangely Police Department will be providing dispatch services for the Dinosaur Marshal's Office through an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA).

Due to the close proximity to the Town of Dinosaur we already receive the majority of the 911 calls from the citizens of Dinosaur. We then transfer those to the Colorado State Patrol Communication Center in Craig.

Rangely Police Department's dispatch services for the Dinosaur Marshal's Office will include 911 and non-emergent phone calls and mutual aid for emergent/non-emergent Officer requested assistance between both Towns.

This partnership has been a long time coming and just makes sense. The Town of Dinosaur and Town of Rangely already share some resources and have been doing so for years.



- The Towns are only approximately 18 miles apart.
- Both Towns are in the far west ends of their counties and have limited resources.
- Children from the Town of Dinosaur attend school in the Rangely School District.
- Rangely District Hospital is the Town of Dinosaur's nearest hospital.
- Both Towns share a workforce.
- The Artesia Fire Department trains often with the Rangely Fire District.
- The Rangely Police Department has trained with the Dinosaur Marshal's Office in the past in several areas.
- The Dinosaur Marshals Office has participated in Rangely Community events such as National Night out and the annual Freedom March.

By providing "local" dispatch services and manpower during emergencies that both Towns often encounter with limited resources, we are able to strengthen public safety on both west ends of Moffat and Rio Blanco Counties.

This partnership was partially made possible by the Rangely Communication Center's very much needed and recent equipment update.

- In the summer of 2021, we updated the 800-radio system from a very outdated Zetron system to a new modern Motorola system. This upgrade helped improve and stabilize radio communication as new technology in the field emerged.
- In November of 2023 we upgraded our 911 phone lines with next gen technology through Central Square. This very
  much needed equipment upgrade improved the quality and location accuracy of 911 phone calls, many that came from
  the Town of Dinosaur already.
- In the summer of 2024, the Rangely Police Department will also be upgrading the last of the equipment needs by upgrading our Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and Record Management System (RMS), also with Central Square.

The Rangely Police Department is very excited to start this partnership with the Dinosaur Marshals Office!

## **College Planning and Visits**

Fall tends to be the time of year where most high school students (especially seniors) and parents begin thinking about college and university plans. It can be a difficult choice for students and the discussion often affects the whole family. That is why early planning is key to making the best decision. Applications for universities, especially those most selective are due typically around January 1st. Regardless of where students choose to attend, those looking to attend in the fall should complete their college applications by April. For the best opportunities for state and federal financial aid, students should have their applications completed and turned in by March 1st.

There are many resources that help students navigate what can be a time consuming and stressful process. For example, the U.S. News and World Report produced an article that I really like entitled 10 Steps to Choosing the Right College back in 2022. Though not all encompassing, most people will tell you to look for the following things when making the decision: Accreditation status, program rankings, cost and financial aid availability, campus life and extracurriculars, size, support services, safety, licensure pass rates, and job placement rates.

For each student, many suitable colleges would love to have them enroll. It is important to select an institution that provides each student with what they are looking for and are uniquely positioned to meet their needs.
