Ten Students from Rangely **High School** Participate in **Drone Aviation** Pathways **Program**

Ten students and two teachers from Rangely High School recently had the opportunity to participate in the 2023 Drone Aviation Pathways Summer Program at CSU in Fort Collins. This groundbreaking initiative is aimed at high school students and instructors across Colorado, empowering them to explore the exciting world of drone aviation.

Generously funded by grants, this program came at no cost to the participating institutions and students. It covered transportation reimbursement, on-campus accommodation, meals, tuition, equipment expenses, and all fees associated with the FAA Part 107 exam, which participants took upon completing the program.

Throughout the program, the students and teachers engaged in a comprehensive educational journey that included classroom instruction, hands-on flight training, captivating lectures, and real-world mission-planning scenarios using various UAV aircraft. They also received curriculum development materials to enrich educational offerings in Rangely.

The students underwent intensive classroom lessons and practice tests, preparing them meticulously for the FAA Part 107 exam. They had the opportunity to fly drones of different sizes and types at Christman Airfield, gaining invaluable practical experience. In the evenings, they honed their skills in a controlled environment at the CSU indoor practice arena.

In addition to exploring drone technology, the program also introduced the participants to both Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) and manned aviation. They enjoyed the thrill of an introductory flight in a manned aircraft at Northern Colorado Regional Airport, courtesy of Aims Community College Aviation Program. Informative breakout sessions were also held to shed light on various aviation career opportunities.

The culmination of the program was the FAA Part 107 exam, which almost every participant successfully achieved, granting them certification to operate drones commercially. As a bonus, Rangely High School received two donated drones, enabling the establishment of a drone program for students and educators to capture stunning images of sports events and picturesque surroundings.

Overall, the 2023 Drone Aviation Pathways Summer Program provided an exceptional opportunity for students and teachers to delve into the world of drone aviation, gaining knowledge and skills that will benefit them in their future endeavors.

The surgery renovation is on schedule, we will be starting a cardio pulmonary rehab program this winter, and we have received several grants through the foundation. I would like to thank our Board of Directors, Keith Peterson, Brad Casto, Ron Granger, Wes White, and Diane Sizemore for their wisdom and insights as we try to improve access, affordability, and quality at our hospital.

The surgery suite construction is scheduled to be finished December 7th. The State has officially approved the engineering design. Demolition has been completed and construction has begun. Most of the steel framing is complete with dry wall coming next. Below are some pictures of the progress

We are excited its coming along and on target for its



completion date. Thanks to everyone who has been involved in the process and those behind the scenes making it all happen.

Cardio Pulmonary rehab will be up and running in a couple of months. Rob Satterly, Zach McCormick, and Doug Dillon all certified respiratory therapist have been working hard on policies and procedures, and ordering a few pieces of equipment to make it happen. This will make it so patients don't have to travel somewhere else for Cardio or Pulmonary Rehab.

Rangely District Hospital Foundation (RDHF) received another grant. In the last edition I mentioned the foundation receiving \$10,000 for a vaccine clinic. We were recently awarded two other grants. One for \$50,000 dollars, which was awarded by The Colorado Housing and Finance Authority (CHFA). This grant is specifically to support our Executive Partnering in Child Care submission. The other is the Access and Affordability grant of \$650,000 to help bring specialty services to Rangely. We are looking into Neurology and partnering with nearby physicians.

Also I would like to thank all the participants who showed up to the 3rd annual golf tournament. We had a great turnout and appreciate all the support.

We have a great team at RDH. Our providers are top

notch, Dr. Morwood, Dr. Torgersen, Dr. Hsu, Dr. Sutton, Vivian, Laramie, and Kelsey are ready to provide the highest quality of care for you and your



family. I have witnessed it with my own family and others. The rest of our ancillary departments are there to assist them. We have the walk-in clinic during the week and ER coverage on the weekends 24/7. We appreciate our communities support! CHILD CARE PARTNERSHIP

On August 30th, the RDH Foundation submitted an application for \$800,000 through the Employer Based Facilities Grant Program. These funds were made available through the passage of Senate Bill 22-213 and can be used towards remodeling, renovating, and retrofitting a child care facility to serve employers in Colorado.

Rangely District Hospital partnered with Giant Step as the Child Care Operator and is collaborating with the Rangely School District to potentially utilize space at the Early Education Center (EEC) on Mainstreet.

CHFA (Colorado Housing & Finance Authority) awarded \$50,000 in Capital Support through their Community Relations program to contribute directly towards the paving of Giant Step's parking lot and Driveway.

The Bank of the San Juans and Glacier National Bank contributed a \$5,000 to be used towards capital improvements. The Town of Rangely has pledged in-kind donations in the form of winter maintenance, consulting, and fee waivers that will be utilized as matching funds.

We appreciate the letters of support from a wide variety of stakeholders including our Early Childhood Council representative at Connections4Kids, the Northwestern **Colorado Development Council (NWCDC) and** the Rio Blanco County Commissioners.

FREE YOUTH ATV/OHV OPERATOR SAFETY COURSE





Hosted by the Town of Rangely and the Rangely Police Department

On October 15th, 2023, beginning at 1:30 pm. The course will be approx. 2 hours in length. The location will be determined later. A parent or guardian will also need to be in attendance.

The basic operator course is designed for riders between the ages of 10 to 15 years old and is required to operate an ATV/OHV within the city limits of Rangely. The goal is to teach basic rules for safe ATV / OHV operations, and the Town of Rangely ATV / OHV regulations. There will be a class portion and then a practical riding portion of the class.

Completion of the ATV Safety Institute ATV E-Course is required for all participants prior to attending the hands-on Town of Rangely ATV / OHV Operator Safety Course. All participants will be required to provide proof of completion. The course can be found at https://atvsafety.org/atv-ecourse/ The e-course is free of charge.

REQUIREMENTS

All participants must provide their own ATV / OHV.
The ATV / OHV must be stock, and in good operating condition. (Brakes, throttle, lights)
All controls must be in good working condition.

The ATV must fit the participant. (Foot and hand placement, reach, controls)

The operator of an OHV must be able to reach the controls while sitting all the way back

the seat and seat belted in.
DOT compliant Helmet.
Goggles or face shield (OHV operators are exempt if there is a full windshield)
Over the ankle boots
Long pants and long sleeve shirt
ATV or Motorcycle gloves.

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

FALL TO DO LIST FOR THE YARD By: Janet Miller







Cut back herbaceous perennials, irises, bulbs.

Plant trees and shrubs. Fall is the ideal time to plant! Cooler temperatures reduce transplant shock and allows the roots to get well established prior to the heat of summer the following season.

Plant spring blooming bulbs such as tulips, daffodils, crocus.

Plant cool season annuals to brighten up the fall/winter garden such as pansies, johnny jump-ups, or ornamental cabbage and kale.

Prune deciduous trees and summer/fall blooming shrubs. Never prune spring blooming shrubs such as lilac or forsythia in the fall. These shrubs set their flower buds in the fall for the spring bloom. Pruning these shrubs in the fall will remove those buds causing them not to bloom.

Divide herbaceous perennials and either plant the divisions in other areas of the yard or share them with friends. I call this "Multiplication by Division."

Wrap the trunks of young and/or smooth barked trees to prevent frost cracks from developing in the winter months.

Fertilize the lawn in early fall. This will help promote a healthy root system which creates a hardy lawn.

Rake up tree leaves and use them in the vegetable garden.

Make sure to drain your hoses and store them out of the weather if they will not be used during the winter months. If it is necessary to use hoses during freezing temperatures, remember to unhook them from the spicket between uses to prevent freezing of pipes.

FALL TO DO LIST FOR THE GARDEN By: Janet Miller



Enjoy the fruits of your labor! The harvest is such a satisfying time of year for the gardener. Take the time to relish this part of the season. What isn't eaten fresh can be shared with neighbors and friends, or frozen, canned, or dehydrated to be enjoyed during those long winter months. Self sufficiency is such a fulfilling experience, whether it be just a small harvest enjoyed with family or producing a bounty that helps to sustain your family and reduce your grocery expenses.

If you would like to extend the growing season, build a cold frame, or use row covers.

Plant a fall crop of cool season vegetables such as spinach, lettuce, kale, radishes, garlic. These crops can tolerate frost and actually do better in the cooler weather!

Evaluate the season! What worked well, what didn't, how can I improve next year?

After harvest, remove the vegetation. Leaving dead plants in the garden can promote disease and insect infestation. Fungus, insects, and disease oftentimes overwinter on the dead plants, so removing them in the fall can prevent these problems from occurring.

If you don't have a compost pile, now is a great time to start one.

Cover the soil with 3-6"of organic matter. You can use things like shredded leaves, grass clippings, manure, hay, or straw (use certified so there are no weed seeds in it). This will protect the soil over winter and amend the soil for the following season. In the spring, you just till it in and you will be ready to plant.

As always, if you have any garden related questions, I am happy to help. I can usually be found at Town hall or on Main Street working to beautify our little Town.

Rio Blanco Water Conservancy District Funds Update

Amidst the ongoing investigation into the theft of a significant portion of the CCITF grant distribution from Rio Blanco County Commissioners, the Rio Blanco Water Conservancy District (RBWCD) is pleased to report that no impacted accounts will suffer any loss as the result of such theft. RBWCD would like to thank our partners at COLOTRUST for their efforts in resolving this matter.

Rio Blanco Water Conservancy District

It is truly disheartening the theft of public funds occurred and unfortunately we are not aware of any criminal charges made at this time. This is a federal investigation that is being treated as an Act of Domestic Terrorism of a critical infrastructure project since the funds are dedicated to a water supply project, Wolf Creek Reservoir.

The \$4,000,000 from Rio Blanco County CCITF grant fund was successfully delivered to RBWCD and then to the district's financial institution where the theft occurred sometime after, who is also an unfortunate victim of this crime.

In all the theft totaled \$3,300,000 of funds. The district was successful at recouping 100% of the theft by 1) recovery of dollars through the federal investigation, 2) settlement with COLOTRUST, and 3) insurance reimbursement.

Driven by this criminal act, the RBWCD adamantly pursued recovery of these funds and was successful. At no time during this event was the districts progression of the Wolf Creek Reservoir project faltered nor did our intergovernmental partners incur any losses.

To date, the district continues to make beneficial progress on permitting Wolf Creek Reservoir that does include opportunities for public engagement. Please stay informed and comment at opportune times since this is a public process. Your thoughts are valuable.

You are encouraged to contact the district to learn more and gather factual responses to your inquiries regarding this beneficial water supply project. We are happy to visit. 




