Water/Wastewater - Submitted by Donald Reed

Project status/Current Issues:

Water Treatment Plant:

- The water treatment plant during the past month has operated mechanically wise in its normal parameters, however the new SCADA system has been installed and as with any new control system we must work the bugs out, there are some additional items that were included as part of this package, and we are waiting on a price quote from Ducey's Electric before proceeding with the remaining items.
- Most of the winter maintenance program is completed but, we still have about 10% of the equipment to go
 through. Currently we are working on the Cleary Building heater that has some blown parts that have been
 ordered.

- Down River Extension Project--- No additional information was given for February but, Michael and I met with Alden out at the Water Conservancy District on January 26th to continue discussions regarding the down river water line project. He showed us what their new proposed path for the water line was. He also proposed a few other lines connecting to our system that would serve other rural customers who aren't currently on our system.
- Current snowpack conditions for the Yampa/White basin is 86% which is 3% below the medium for this time of the year. We need additional precipitation to increase this percentage prior to spring runoff, to help prevent drought restriction conditions.
- During the PAC committee meeting it was being expressed to reach out to all users that use flood irrigation to help mitigate drought restrictions by increasing flooding during the spring run as much as possible to reach 100% of ground saturation wherever possible.
- We are still working on the Utilities Master Plan and are on schedule to have it completed by Spring of this year.
- The Consecutive Water Agreement is still being worked on for Scout, but it sounds like they are keen on keeping the exact same agreement we had with Chevron. We're still waiting on final paperwork.
- Water loss calculations for January 2022 is 11.3% This number is expected to go down substantially for the year 2022. The primary target for looking into water loss from distribution leaks is in middle zone distribution zone currently.
- Monthly compliance reports were sent to state with no violations being noted.
- Backflow Cross Connection program for 2022 has already begun and we've already had several facilities submit their test results for backflow preventers.
- At the request of EPA all municipalities are required to upgrade the Emergency Response Plan regarding handling in the event of a Cyber-attack on all support and mission essential facilities, along with plans on loss of electrical grids for extended periods of time. The department already has contingency plans in place for these types of events, but we will have to re-evaluate with a cyber-attack in drafting response on actions required. This would also require us to upgrade our (SOP) Standard Operating Procedures.

Wastewater Plant:

- Head Works Building Project—Mueller construction broke ground the first week of January. So far, they've been completed a shoring wall, installed casings for the removal of ground water, and have fully excavated the area for the influent wet well. Public works installed a bypass water line around the construction site to give Muller more room to install wet-wells and manholes. Excavation has continued and Mueller is almost ready to pour slabs for the wet wells, however, a geo tech report from snowshoe engineering changed the course of work for the time being. They can continue with work, and we already have a plan to mitigate possible shale swelling to prevent cracking of the foundation using micro piles and additional bedding gravel. This will require the drilling rigs to come back for installation but will protect against future damage and does not put us behind schedule. In the meantime, Mueller can excavate the effluent wet well and pour that slab first. They may need to use a crane to place the mats for the influent wet well or may be able to build a path down into that weather dependent.
- Huber completed its damage inspection on the shipped unit and will be sending replacement parts as required. The R09 unit will be scheduled for a dry fire prior to going online, so to verify the correct operational status.
- Headworks was still having some electrical issues, especially downstairs where the H2S is more concentrated. We had to pull a little bit of wire to repair an outlet that kept frying one of our breakers.
- State Compliance Reports were sent out with no violations.

Utility Department Activities:

- Completed locates, meter reads and rereads, high/low report, and work orders as required.
- Assisted Public works in snow removal on a couple of occasions. Plus, snow removal of our facilities.

 - Required by state and operations.

- All staff members of the department have been attending training webinars and attending meeting regarding the future mandates for both water and wastewater.
- Emily has been working with Jocelyn on the day to reports and overseeing on the Head Works building project.
- Worked on multiple water line breaks at the WWTP with public works.

Mosquitoes Fast Facts



Scent, Sight, and Heat...

Mosquitoes locate blood hosts by scent, sight and heat. From 100 feet away (30 meters) mosquitoes can smell your scent, especially the carbon dioxide (CO2) you exhale. Biting flies are even better; they can smell their prey from 300 feet (100 meters) away. Because CO2 is present in the atmosphere (plants take in CO2 and give off oxygen), mosquitoes respond to higher-than-normal concentrations, especially when the CO2 is mixed with host-odor. They follow your scent upwind, and can see you at a distance of about 30 feet (10 meters).

A Prolific Species...

One female mosquito may lay 100 to 300 eggs at a time and may average 1,000 to 3,000 offspring's during her life span. Mosquitoes breed in standing water, so eliminating standing water on your property reduces your risk. Areas like rain gutters, tree holes, old buckets or tires with stagnant water are breeding sites. However, although you may have taken steps to clear your property, you are subject to the actions – or inaction – of your neighbors, not to mention wetland areas in your community.

Fast Facts...

- You're more likely to be a target for mosquitoes if you consume bananas.
- Mosquitoes prefer children to adults, and blondes to brunettes.
- Light colors are less attractive to mosquitoes than dark colors; thus, mosquitoes are more likely to choose a victim wearing darker colors.
- Mosquitoes dislike citronella because it irritates their feet.
- Biting activity increase by 500 times when there is a full moon.
- A mosquito's wings beat 500 times a second.
- The average life span of a female mosquito is 3 to 100 days. The male lives 10 to 20 days.
- The animal responsible for the most human deaths world-wide is the mosquito.

Mosquitoes Tips

Larviciding Tips:

- Spider webs in corners or around storm drains and catch basins are a good indicator that breeding may be occurring in the water below.
- Catch basins and storm drains can produce huge Culex numbers. Pre-treatment with briquettes can reduce breeding for months.
- A quick, simple way to apply BTI at an effective rate is one granule per square foot imagine a tile floor and one granule per square. Great for fresh water treatment sites and wood land pools.
- To calibrate a granular applicator, attach a nylon stocking to the outlet, catch the granules for a measured period of time, and weigh with a digital fish scale to determine application rate per time period.
- Google earth, a free satellite imagery program, can be a very effective tool for finding and measuring
 potential breeding sites prior to onsite inspections. To download visit: https://www.google.com/earth/
- To improve canopy penetration when using liquid larvicides, you can increase the dilution rate up to 10-fold to ensure more active ingredient reaches the water surface: if you are normally applying 1 qt of liquid Bti/acre in 10 gallons of water per acre, you can try to improve penetration by increase to 1 qt of Bti liquid in 100 gallons of water per acre.

Adulticiding Tips:

- Post reflective markers signifying which homes are designated as no spray zones.
- Employ variable flow technology to your existing spray equipment-stay on label rate for maximum efficacy, to save precious time and budget dollars.
- Rotate the active ingredient (change product classes), during the season or few years, to help avoid chemical resistance in areas inhabited by mosquitoes prone to this issue.
- After yearly fogger calibration has been preformed, use a locking nut to secure pump flow rate adjustment knob. For added security keep pump box locked at all times.
- Use today's technology to set up an automated text message notification system informing residents when fogging will occur in their neighborhood.
- To protect the few adulticides currently, apply <u>organophosphates</u> or natural pyrethrum by air and synthetic pyrethoids by ground.

Larval Mosquito Surveillance

Larval surveillance is one of the most important aspects of a mosquito control program. With continuous surveillance of larval habitats, mosquito population surges can be predicted and often abated through the well-timed application of larvicides. Additionally, knowledge of mosquito-breeding sites can increase adulticide efficacy because these areas can be selectively targeted before adult mosquitoes disperse to nearby areas.

Suspected breeding areas need to be checked for the presence of mosquito larvae before any control work can begin. Scoop up water from the site and inspect for the presence of mosquito larvae and/or pupae.

Larval Mosquito Control

It is much easier to control mosquito larvae than it is to control adults. Additionally, larval mosquito control when done properly has very little impact on non-target species and their habitat.

Once you've located mosquito larvae it's time to apply a larvicide. Time is of the essence, depending on the temperature of the water, a mosquito can go from egg to adult in as quickly as 4 days. There are several larvicides commercially available and several different methods for applying them.

Adult Mosquito Surveillance

Adult mosquito surveillance is necessary to determine the relative mosquito populations after a disaster event. Knowing the relative populations around a city, county, or even state can help direct resources and valuable insecticides to the most impacted areas in terms of mosquito populations. By identifying the collections, we can estimate the mosquito's flight range, risk of mosquito-borne illness, and ultimately improve efficacy of control efforts.

Adult Mosquito Control

If adult mosquito populations have already increased, adult mosquito control should commence as your next line of defense against rising populations. Adulticiding is the application of products into the air to reduce the population of adult mosquitoes. These "adulticides" are usually applied by handheld, ATV/UTV mounted, or truck mounted ULV (Ultra Low Volume) aerosol generators. ADAPCO® provides a variety of sprayers designed to disperse the droplet size needed for proper mosquito control.

When truck applications are not feasible or acreage is too large, aerial adulticiding becomes more effective and efficient. The amount of product applied varies on the product type and active ingredient, but usually is in the range of 1 oz/acre. The act of adulticiding provides immediate temporary control of adult mosquito populations. During a disaster situation, repeated applications may be necessary until breeding habitat is removed or dries.
