2. **Roll Call** – Andy Shaffer, Trey Robie, Tim Webber, Alisa Granger, and Keely Ellis present. Luke Geer present via phone.
3. **Invocation** – Led by Tim Webber

 - a. *Discussion and Action to approve the minutes of June 8, 2021.* – **Motion made by Tim Webber to approve the minutes of June 8, 2021, second by Alisa Granger. Motion passed**

7. **Changes to the Agenda** – Add Don Reed to Supervisor Report to update water/drought conditions.

9. **Committee/Board Meetings** – RDA/RDC met on June 10th. Most of the meeting was giving updates including bike paths and façade grants thru Main Street. Planning and Zoning held their bi-annual meeting and noted ongoing building permits. They are also looking for board members. There will be Raw Water meeting scheduled soon.
10. **RBC Commissioner Reports** – No updates to report
11. **Council Reports** – One applicant for Town Council so far. Also working on the Ordinance for Town Council attendance.
12. **Supervisor Reports – See Attached**
 - a. *Kelli Neiberger* – Kelli reported that gas usage in 2021 has been higher. She also reported that there was a leak found on the Town of Rangely's pipe with Williams and was shut down for 2 days to make the repairs. All periodic meter changes from 2020 have been completed. Operator training has been completed also. New meter reading equipment will be arriving and Itron will be providing training. Kelli stated that there should be some discussion at looking at options for future gas purchases.

- b. *Don Reed* - Don was present to update the council on the water/drought situation. He indicated that the river is dropping. Don stated that after looking at historical data we are not as bad as in 2002. He stated that we could draw from the reservoir to provide water to the Town. Don stated that they would have to work with Chevron.

13. Reports from Officers – Town Manager Update – Lisa reported that there was a meeting with Incident Command held to give an update on the Oil Springs Fire. Lisa stated that fire hydrants have been setup for them to pull from. They have their own Media people that will be giving constant updates. Stage 2 Fire Restrictions will go into effect June 25th. Public Works is staying busy with projects. Code Enforcement will be hitting more of Main Street to get the weeds cleaned up. Jon continues to fog the mosquitos and will continue to do so. Coulter Aviation still has not received materials for aerial spraying. The police department will have 2 new dispatchers starting. Officer Hilton will start training with Niko, the new K-9. Andy Shaffer stated that fire restriction are followed by what Rio Blanco County sets.

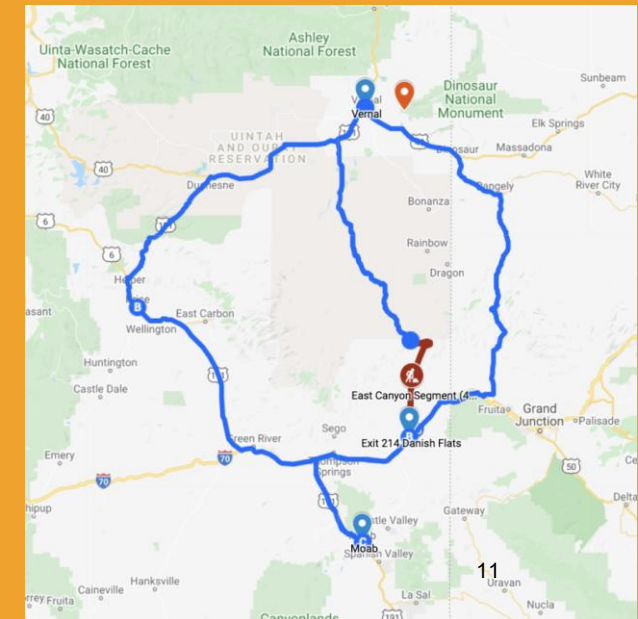
Eastern Utah Regional Connection (aka Book Cliffs Highway)

Grand County, Utah



Proposal

- Seven County Infrastructure Coalition (SCIC)
- Completion of Seep Ridge Road via Grand County along the Divide and down East Canyon
- 35 miles of highway
- Cost projections ranging from 200-400 million
- Funding via Biden's Covid and/or infrastructure packages



SCIC Objectives

- Fill the need for a developed transportation corridor from the Uinta Basin to I-70
- Unpaved roads of Hay and East Canyons are insufficient to support the people and products that could be moved through the Book Cliffs
- Existing roads are dangerous and/or impassable in the winter
- The existing travel corridors through Dinosaur/Rangely and Duchesne/Helper are miles longer than the proposed route
- This highway would provide a more direct route for tourism that moves from Yellowstone to Flaming Gorge, Dinosaur National Monument to the Mighty Five in Southern Utah



Detriments to Utah

- Taxpayers' dollars (Grand and statewide) going to an infrastructure project that is unwanted and irrelevant
- Grand County, although being told we will not be saddled with construction or maintenance costs, will be spending monies on enforcement, search and rescue and maintenance on county B roads
- Wildlife (habitat fragmentation, invasive species/plant, increased poaching, increased roadkill)
- Lee and Deb Elmgreen that live at the mouth of East and Hay Canyons will lose a portion of their ranch via imminent domain



Detriments to Dinosaur & Rangely

- In building this highway, the Eastern Utah Regional Connection will bypass the existing travel corridors
- These travel corridors are vital to the economic diversity of communities on the west side of this proposal such as Duchesne, Helper, Price and Green River and on east side, Dinosaur and Rangely
- The north side of the Book Cliffs has historically been supported by extractive industries; however, tourism is becoming more prominent and thus can be a key component to the livelihoods of such communities

Ordinance 696 (2021)

AN ORDINANCE ENACTING NEW SECTIONS, WITHIN TITLE 2 REQUIRING AT LEAST 80 % ATTENDANCE BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD MEMBERS AT ALL REGULAR AND SPECIAL MEETINGS

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rangely (“Council”) determined to schedule a public hearing to obtain public input about requiring minimum attendance for the mayor and members of the board of trustees; and

WHEREAS, public hearings were held on July 13, 2021, and August 10, 2021 by the Council at the Rangely Town Hall with public notice thereof having been given in the Rio Blanco Herald Times newspaper on July 8th, 2021 and August 5th, 2021; and

WHEREAS, while the board of trustees understands the time constraints and sacrifices made by the mayor and trustees in order to serve as mayor and/or trustees, the reality is also that without presence at regular and special board meetings, citizens’ opportunities to have input to the council in open sessions is curtailed, Town staff are limited in being able to fully understand the policy guidance of the board when not all members are present, and the burden of decision-making can unfairly fall on those attending meetings; and

WHEREAS, the effective operation of the board depends on the regular attendance of the mayor and each board member; and

WHEREAS, effective September 10, 2021, attendance of the mayor and members of the Town board of trustees at regular and special meetings will be regulated by these provisions of the Rangely Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, the Council has duly considered the input given at such hearings by the public; and,

WHEREAS, based on the testimony received, the advice of Town staff and the experience of members of the Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF RANGELY, COLORADO:

1. For most efficient and fair process of governance by the Board, and for the reasons stated above, and thus for the general health, welfare and safety of the citizens, the Town staff and members of the board of trustees the BOARD FINDS AND DETERMINES that the members of the board of trustees, including the mayor, in order to govern effectively, must meet certain specified attendance minimums, as set forth below.

2. A new section 2.08.035, titled “Mayoral Attendance Requirements” is hereby adopted, to read:

A. Each calendar year and each twelve consecutive months, the mayor is required to attend no less than eighty percent (80%) of all regular and special meetings, and the mayor shall be required to miss no more than two consecutive regular or special meetings.

B. Pursuant to C.R.S. 31-4-307, by a majority vote of all members of the board of trustees, a mayor may be removed from office, including for violation of the preceding subsection 2.08.035 A.

C. The Town Clerk shall notify all members of the board, including the mayor, when her or his records show a violation of RMC 2.08.035 A.

D. Upon receipt of such a notice from the Town Clerk, the mayor or any member of the board of trustees shall schedule for the next available regular meeting the question of whether or not the mayor shall be removed from his/her office for violation of RMC 2.08.035 A..

E. The said notice from the Town Clerk shall be deemed to be the ‘charge’ referred to in C.R.S. 31-4-307.

F. The board shall not vote to remove a mayor until the mayor has had an opportunity to be heard on the question.

G. Notwithstanding any contrary provision in this section, the board of trustees may authorize absences of the mayor, in the board’s discretion.

3. A new section 2.08.025, titled “Trustee Attendance Requirements” is hereby adopted, to read:

A. Each calendar year and each twelve consecutive months, each member of the board of trustees is required to attend no less than eighty percent (80%) of all regular and special meetings, and each trustee shall be required to miss no more than two consecutive regular or special meetings.

B. Pursuant to C.R.S. 31-4-307, by a majority vote of all members of the board of trustees, a board member may be removed from office, including for violation of the preceding subsection 2.08.025 A.

C. The Town Clerk shall notify all members of the board, including the mayor, when her or his records show a violation of RMC 2.08.025 A.

D. Upon receipt of such a notice from the Town Clerk, the mayor or any member of the board of trustees shall schedule for the next available regular meeting the question of whether or not the subject board member shall be removed from his/her office for violation of RMC 2.08.025 A.

E. The said notice from the Town Clerk shall be deemed to be the ‘charge’ referred to in C.R.S. 31-4-307.

F. The board shall not vote to remove a board member until the subject board member has had an opportunity to be heard on the question.

G. Notwithstanding any contrary provision in this section, the board of trustees may authorize absences of any board member, in the board’s discretion.

4. The following provisions are also hereby adopted:

- A. If any part of this ordinance is invalidated for any reason, it shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.
- B. This ordinance shall be effective thirty (30) days after publication following final passage.

GAS DEPARTMENT/Building & Grounds – SUBMITTED BY KELLI NEIBERGER

Project status/Current Issues:

- Meter Reading, get reads off large meters, go over reports and meter proof, make corrections, reprogram meters, final meter proof, recheck proof after gas rate calculated – make final changes.
- Gas usages and rate for May
- Weekly charts, pressures, odorant check
- Leak Calls – 2
- Customer Calls – 1
- Carbon Monoxide tests - 0
- Locates for June - 45
- Work Orders – 19
- NPSO – (Non-payment shut-offs) – shut 2 customers off middle of month. Two more customers went off later after promised payment was not received.
- Williams pipeline had to shut the natural gas feed down to the Town in order to make repairs on the 4” steel line. During this process, Williams hired a compressed natural gas truck that provided gas to the Town while repairs were made. Our odorization system was shut down for nearly two days and brought back online when gas was restored to the 4” feed. The process went smoothly.
- Periodic Meter Changes – we have completed about 70% of these for 2021.
- Periodic monitoring of Border Station
- Purchasing – we continue to purchase necessities but are being careful not to spend unnecessarily.
- Checks on construction crews working in Town.

Water Treatment Plant:

General note. The Department remains in full operations but is still adhering to Covid-19 policies and procedures.

- Current conditions for the month of June were a little more unstable than the previous months and with higher-than-average flows and weather conditions changed the parameters of operations and required operators to monitor production more closely though out the days. On the plus side of operations since cleaning out a lot of the dead vegetation in the North preset pond the Total Organic Carbon removal has increased considerably keeping us safely below state compliance parameters.
- The department took down both the east and west sedimentation basins at the plant and completed a bi-annual inspection with no noted problems. Basin were also cleaned for the quarterly maintenance program.
- Snowpack conditions are at 1% which concludes the annual run off, during the course of the last few weeks cfs flow has dropped off, which is normal for this time of the year. As of 06/30/21, river flow is at 345cfs. There is no threat at this time of having to implement drought restrictions.
- The Water Conservancy District will continue to hold meetings for the extension of the water distribution system along County Rd 102. The response has picked up some in hopes of the project being able to move forward.
- The department is still working with engineering on working out the final specifics on the La Mesa waterline project and should have bid packages go out the first part of July.
- Have completed 80% of the Utilities Master Plan. Is still a work in progress.
- The Chevron agreement has been fully worked out and is in the signing stage and will go into operation once approval is given and final documentation is received by the department from Chevron. We will meet with the middle of July.
- Completed and posted the annual Consumer Confidence Report for 2020 with one Tier 1 violation which was having to issue a Boil Order for a water line break in May of 2020. No follow up or action is required was required by State.
- Started the annual flushing program for the distribution system and have completed Middle Zone and will start on High Zone next.
- Monthly compliance reports were sent to state with no compliance violations for this reporting period.
- Michael is working on organizing a contractor to work with the Town for the Backflow Cross-connection program and is hoping to schedule sometime in July or August.
- Filed State Eligibility Reports for DOLA grant with State for the year of 2022.
- Jetted various problems spots in Town.
- Had Raw water user meeting on 06/30/2021 and proposed options for the future of the raw water system.
- Worked on Raw water system repairs and maintenance problems with users on their systems.
- Completed partial contract with Timberline for the SCADA system at the Water Plant on upgrades this should allow for some relief on repairs now that we have some spare part for the other unit.

Wastewater Plant:

- Worked on repairs of the aeration systems throughout the facility we have been experiencing problems with the system. Once we repair one air leak another one pops up, this is basically due to the age of the infrastructure.
- Head Works building project. Continued having meetings with SGM and Jocelyn and we have almost finished up reviewing all of the specs and details of the project Issued PO on major equipment items needed due to lead times on equipment from the manufactures. Working on other pieces of equipment that needs ordering as soon as possible also due to lead times.

- Working on the UV system off and on to keep it up and running as long as possible.
- Completed state reports and sent with no violations on compliance for this month.
- Continuing to work on cleaning up of common areas at wastewater plant and patched in potholes in all roadways at the plant.

Utility Department Activities:

- Had 46 Locates, meter reads and rereads, 6 Work orders. High/Low usage report.
- Joe and I assist Public Works in working on the storm water drainage system at various spots around Town.
- In progress the Department started a (Water Audit Project) this will be an ongoing project. This project consists of breaking down and isolating the water users for the town in hopes of identifying potential high-water loss areas by zones. This is a new approach to an old problem. State does not currently have a reporting program for water loss, but it is being recommended down the pike.
- Department still working on a facility assessment and inventory program which also be part of the Utilities Mater Plan.
- Attended meetings with PAC and Douglas Creek Advisory Board and Water Conservancy.

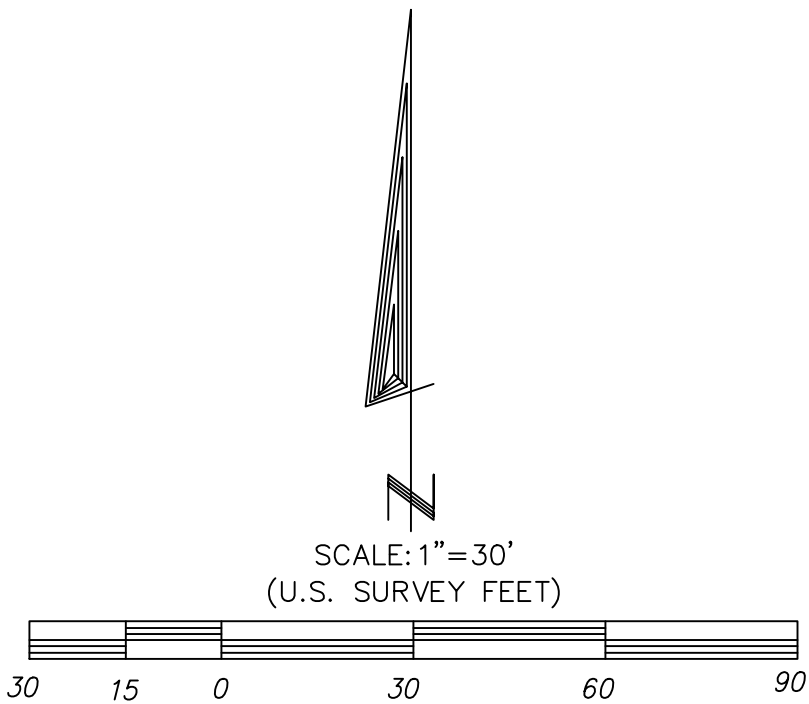

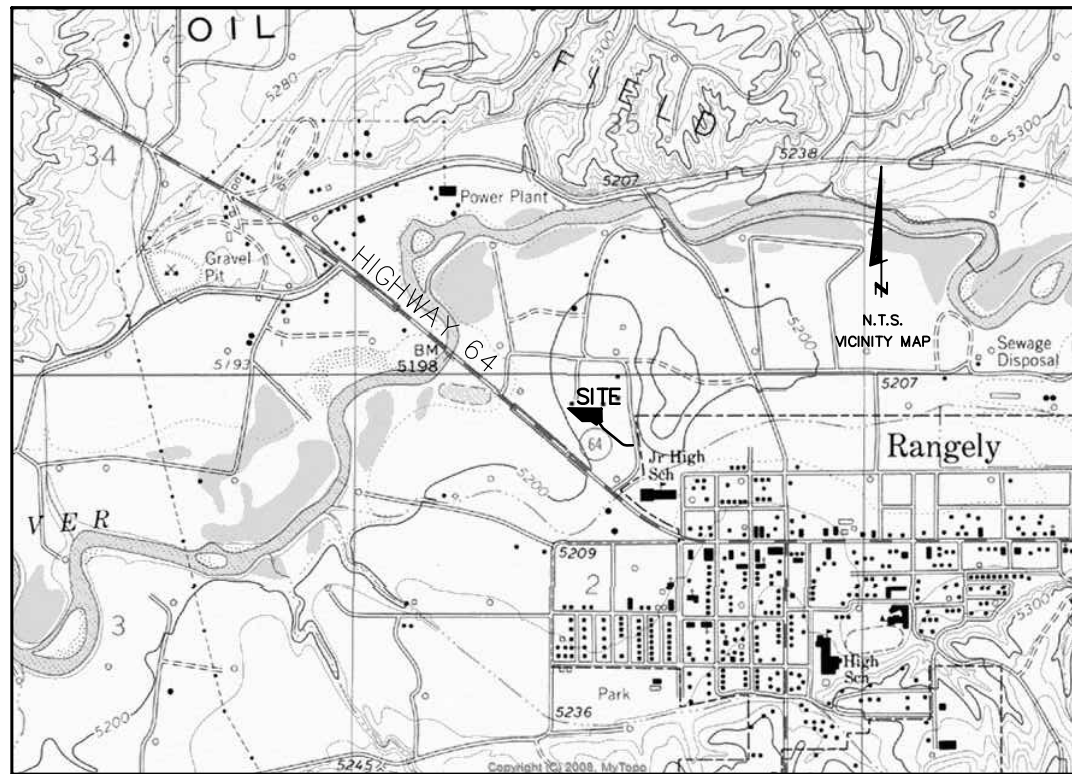

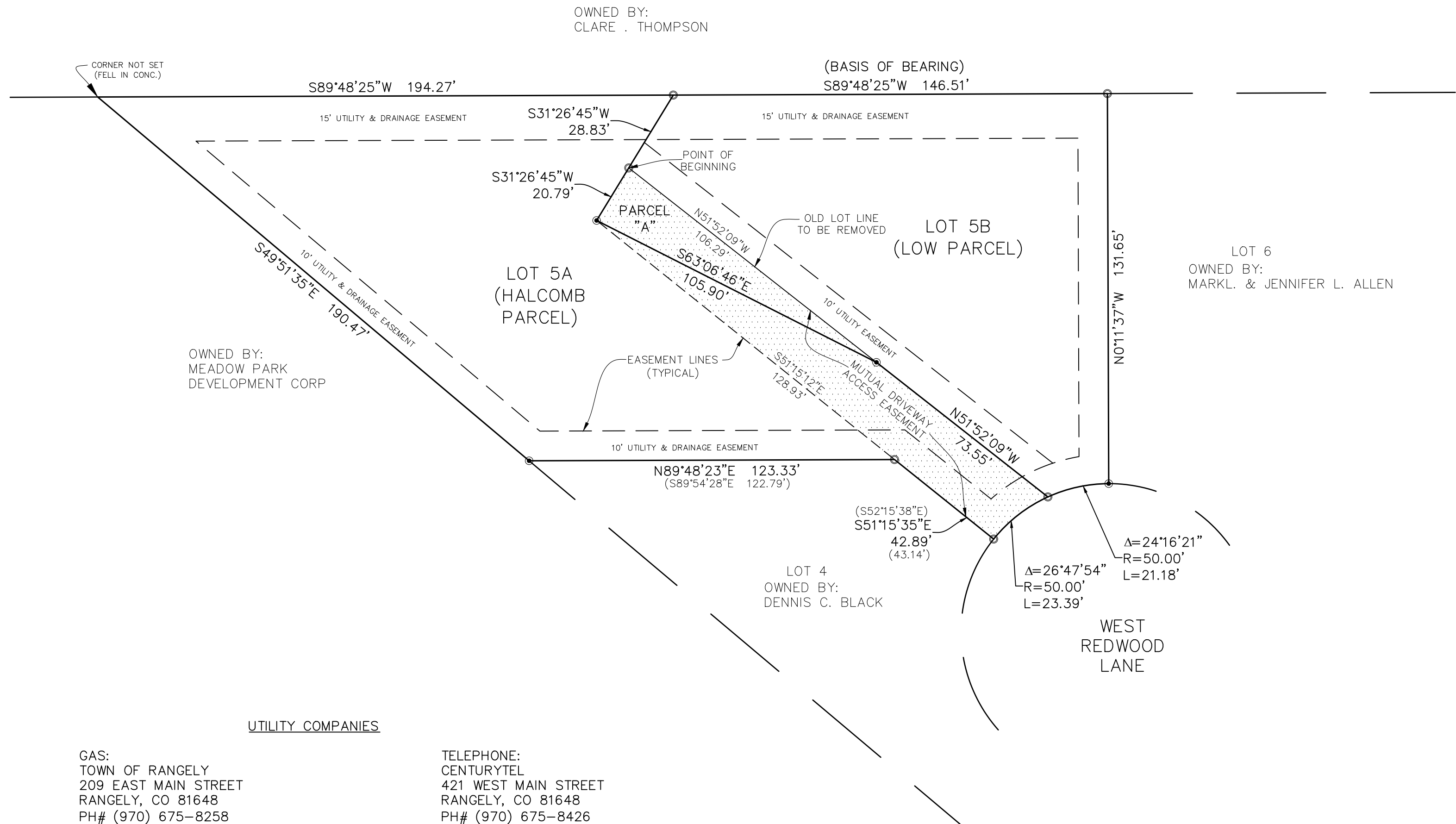

- B. To fulfill TOR's responsibilities under Reg 100 and Reg 11, TOR currently employs "Certified Operators," as defined in Reg 100, to operate TOR's domestic drinking water treatment and distribution facilities.
- C. Chevron owns and operates its own domestic drinking water distribution facilities and desires to contract with TOR for TOR to provide routine operational services through TOR's Certified Operators for Chevron's Water System.
- D. These same parties entered into an agreement dated November 20, 2020, whereby Chevron's System is a "consecutive system" to TOR's public water system; that agreement sets forth rights and responsibilities pursuant to Colorado and federal laws and regulations.
- E. In accordance with the terms of this Agreement, TOR is willing to assist Chevron by providing TOR's Certified Operators to provide routine operational services for Chevron's System, in compliance with Reg 100 and Reg 11.
- F. Per Reg 100.4, Chevron's System is classified as a Class 1 distribution system.
- G. Chevron's representatives have determined that it is in the interests of Chevron to contract with TOR as set forth herein.
- H. Based on the representations made by Chevron to TOR, TOR's Town Council finds that it is in the interests of TOR to assist Chevron as set forth herein; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein contained, the Parties agree as follows:

1. The above Recitals are substantive provisions of this Agreement, as though set forth in

full below.

2. The “System” consists of those facilities that comprise Chevron’s Water System, as shown on the diagram attached as **Exhibit A. Note: Notwithstanding other provisions herein, this Agreement is not effective until Exhibit A is in fact attached hereto.**
3. Notwithstanding any contrary provision herein, Chevron’s System is and shall remain owned by and the property of Chevron, which shall continue to be legally and operationally responsible for the operation and maintenance thereof in compliance with industry standards (as expressed by Reg 100) and any other applicable Colorado regulations.
4. Chevron agrees to abide by and conform to all applicable rules and regulations with respect to distribution and provision of potable water and agrees that its duties in this regard are independent of any duty of any Certified Operator to inform Chevron about applicable regulations and industry standards, as understood by a Certified Operator. Chevron and the Town understand and accept that Certified Operators in responsible charge (“ORC”) are responsible for the operation and maintenance of Chevron’s System and for understanding the requirements of the applicable permits, laws and regulations; however, the parties also agree that Chevron’s involved employees are also duty-bound to understand and comply with applicable regulations and standards. The Town’s ORCs who are assigned to the Chevron System must have supervisory authority over operation of Chevron’s Water System, and authority to delegate to Chevron employees. Chevron agrees that its employees shall abide by the reasonable directions and guidance given by the ORCs regarding operation of Chevron’s Water System, for example:
 - a. Controlling, supervising or actively participating in the planning, operation and maintenance of Chevron’s Water System.
 - b. Making process control and system integrity decisions on the operation and maintenance of Chevron’s Water System.
 - c. Making decisions and initiating actions regarding the operation of Chevron’s Water System.
 - d. Inspecting and testing new, modified, or repaired Chevron’s Water System’s facilities prior to placing or returning such facilities into service.
 - e. Developing maintenance programs; and
 - f. Developing and maintaining the written operating plan as described in section 100.11.6 of Reg 100.

Chevron further agrees that, upon notice by TOR operators that actions taken are not appropriate or result in noncompliance, Chevron will take actions to return to compliance within 48 hours, or as soon as reasonably practicable with notice to TOR that 48 hours is not possible, and failure to do so may result in termination of this agreement.

5. TOR Services

- a. TOR agrees that its Certified Operators shall exercise their reasonable professional judgment in providing the services described herein.
- b. TOR, through one or more of its Certified Operators, shall assume the routine operational

responsibilities for Chevron's Water System, including the following:

- i. Performing service calls to Chevron's Water System at least once a per week, or as needed.
- ii. Assisting Chevron's designee(s) in maintaining lawful system operation and management, testing and record keeping duties, including creation of a Written Operating Plan as required by Reg 100, reviewing all data collected as part of compliance prior to submittal to the State, and providing or discussing other information, procedures, and requirements with Chevron's designees.
- iii. Notifying Chevron's designee of any needed equipment repairs, replacements, non-routine maintenance, and supplies.
- iv. Collecting and delivering scheduled drinking water samples to certified lab(s) recommended by a Certified Operator, as required by the State of Colorado at such times as are required by the State;
- v. Providing consulting reports on an as needed basis to Chevron's designee.

c. The Certified Operators shall devote such time and attention as shall be required for the competent implementation of the Certified Operator's duties as set forth in this Agreement and under Colorado law.

d. TOR shall not be entitled to payment for more than thirty (30) hours of Certified Operators services in any calendar month for the first 6 months of operations under this Agreement, and twenty (20) hours per month thereafter without prior authorization in writing (which may be via text message or email) from a Chevron designee.

6. Chevron's Payments to TOR; Duty to Specify Local Designee. In accordance with TOR's billings, once each calendar month within 30 days after TOR has emailed the billing to Chevron's designee, Chevron shall deliver payment in full to TOR to compensate, or reimburse as the case may be, TOR for services rendered hereunder, including:

- a. All time spent by TOR's Certified Operator(s), according to daily logs kept by the Certified Operators, applicable portions of which shall be included by TOR with each monthly billing statement to Chevron's designee.
- b. All amounts paid by TOR as directed by a Certified Operator on behalf of Chevron relating to the services provided by TOR or paid in order to keep Chevron's System in compliance with applicable laws and regulations, in the reasonable judgment of the Certified Operator(s); and
- c. For delivering time sensitive samples, as reasonably determined by the Certified Operator(s). TOR notes that such deliveries should be relatively infrequent.

- d. Payment. In exchange for the performance of the duties described herein by TOR's Certified Operators, Chevron shall pay TOR the sum of \$90.00 per hour or portion thereof, which includes costs associated with the use of TOR vehicles. TOR shall invoice Chevron monthly in arrears of the services provided. Chevron shall pay each such invoice within 30 days of delivery (by mail or email) to a Chevron designee. If Chevron does not pay within 30 days, TOR may charge a late fee of five percent (5%) for each month or portion thereof that a bill is not timely paid and may impose delinquent interest of 1½ percent per month. If TOR does not timely receive any such payment within sixty (60) days, it may give written notice of intent to terminate; however, TOR agrees to continue to provide its Certified Operator's services at Chevron's request for up to 60 days following delivering of the notice of intent to terminate. During said up-to-sixty days the hourly rate paid for ORC time shall be \$150.00 per hour instead of the ordinary hourly rate of \$90.00. In no event may TOR terminate this agreement for nonpayment so long as Chevron makes full payment on any amount owed, including late fees and interest, within 90 days.
- e. If Certified Operator(s) are required to provide services outside of TOR's normal business hours ("emergency call"), Chevron agrees to pay for those services at 1.5 times the base \$90.00 per hour rate, Chevron agrees that TOR will be paid for at least two hours for each emergency call.
- f. TOR agrees to make available a Certified Operator(s) for additional hours of service if unforeseen events require his/her/their participation, in order to maintain Chevron's System in compliance; such additional charges will be billed at the ordinary hourly rate of \$90, except as provided in 6(d) and (e).
- g. Payment for Additional Duties. In the event that additional duties or services are required of TOR in the routine maintenance of the Chevron's System beyond those described in this Agreement, Chevron will pay TOR for such hours of service at the same base rate. Except in the case of emergency as reasonably determined by a Certified Operator or Chevron's designee, TOR shall notify Chevron in advance of providing any such additional services and shall obtain a Chevron designee's written approval (which may be via text or email) prior to commencement of such additional services or duties.
- h. Duty to Designate Local Chevron Representative. Chevron hereby names the following persons as Chevron's authorized designees hereunder; Chevron agrees to name replacement designee(s) whenever a previously named designee is no longer available or fails to act or respond to an ORC or Certified Operator, to wit:

- i. If, for whatever reason, TOR or a Certified Operator is unable to obtain input or a decision of a Designee despite reasonable efforts to do so, TOR and its Certified Operator(s) are, notwithstanding any other provision herein, authorized to take such actions as reasonably required to stay in compliance with applicable State and federal regulations and requirement.

7. No Power to Act. Except as specifically provided herein or as otherwise agreed in writing between the parties, TOR shall have no authority, right, power or ability to create any contract or obligation binding on Chevron without written approval of a Chevron designee (which may be via text or email), nor shall TOR or any Certified Operator hold itself or him- or herself out as having any such authority, right, power or ability.
8. Repair of System. Neither TOR nor any Certified Operator shall be liable or responsible for the faulty repair or replacement of any or all of Chevron's System, unless Chevron proves by a preponderance of evidence that an alleged faulty repair or replacement is due to the negligent act ("wrongful act") of a Certified Operator or other TOR employee. Chevron agrees that any failure of any aspect or portion of Chevron's System of which a Certified Operator becomes reasonably aware of through routine checks or should have become reasonably aware of through routine checks, is the responsibility of Chevron, and Chevron has the sole liability therefor, in the absence of a proven wrongful act. However, each Certified Operator has the duty to inform Chevron designee within a period of time that is reasonable under the circumstances according to the need, and in no event more than 24 hours, if such Certified Operator has actual knowledge of an impending failure or impending need for repairs or other reasonable actions.
9. Costs. Chevron shall procure all materials, supplies and outside services necessary to carry out its obligations and duties reasonably required under this Agreement and the costs thereof which are incurred for work under this Agreement shall be paid by Chevron. In the event that Chevron fails to procure items necessary, in the reasonable judgment of the Certified Operator, to maintain compliance, TOR shall procure such necessary items and Chevron shall reimburse TOR as outlined in 5.d above.
10. Employees of TOR. Chevron agrees that TOR may assign any of its Certified Operators to fulfill TOR's duties and obligations under this Agreement, and TOR agrees that Chevron is in no way responsible for the wages or compensation or benefits of such TOR employees.
11. Independent Contractor Status. The parties stipulate and agree that TOR and its Certified Operators are not partners, joint venturers, owners or employees of Chevron, but that TOR is solely acting under the Agreement as an independent contractor, as defined by Colorado law and the Certified Operators are and shall remain at all times employees of TOR.
12. Licenses and Conformance to Laws. TOR agrees that it is responsible to and shall perform the duties and services set forth in this Agreement in compliance with all applicable federal and state laws and regulations, which includes, at TOR's expense while this Agreement is in effect, seeing that TOR's assigned Certified Operators have in effect all required certifications and licenses that are required for the services provided to Chevron with respect to Chevron's System.
13. Indemnification. Hold Harmless. Except to the extent caused or contributed to by TOR's sole, joint or concurrent negligence, to the fullest extent otherwise permitted by law, Chevron hereby agrees that it shall indemnify and hold TOR (and its employees, agents officials and

Council members) harmless from and against administrative and judicial claims, damages, losses and expenses made by any person including Chevron (and Chevron's employees, officers, directors, agents and shareholders), arising out of the acts or omissions of Chevron or Chevron's employees, officers, shareholders, directors and/or agents.

14. The parties stipulate and agree that no provision of this Agreement shall be construed or applied in a way to obviate all defenses and protections of TOR under Colorado's Governmental Immunity Act, C.R.S. § 24-10-101, *et seq.*

15. Insurance

a. TOR shall, at no cost to Chevron, maintain in full force and effect during this Agreement its existing insurance coverages provided by the Colorado Intergovernmental Risk Sharing Agency (CIRSA), and shall provide to Chevron a copy of a Certificate of Insurance at any time upon request. TOR represents that TOR's current CIRSA/Pinnacol insurance provides for these coverages: \$10 million for Commercial General Liability, \$5 million automotive liability, and \$1 million worker's compensation per each accident/employee.

b. Chevron shall, at no cost to TOR, maintain in full force and effect during this Agreement and for at least three years following termination or expiration of this Agreement, coverages and limits that are equal to or better than those currently provided to TOR by CIRSA.

c. Chevron agrees to provide to TOR's Town Manager, before TOR is obligated to begin providing services hereunder, a copy of Chevron's Certificate of Insurance, and proof that the TOR is named as an additional insured under Chevron's insurance and that Chevron's insurance coverages cannot be terminated or cancelled without TOR first receiving written notice at least thirty calendar days prior to any such termination or cancellation.

16. Non-Disclosure of Information. Except as required by an administrative agency with jurisdiction or a court's order, Colorado's Open Records statutes or other applicable law, or by the Water Quality Control Division of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (the "Division"), TOR (for itself and its Council members, officials, agents and employees) agrees that it will not voluntarily at any time, whether during or subsequent to the terms of this Agreement, either directly or indirectly, divulge, disclose or reveal to any person, firm or corporation other than Chevron in any manner whatsoever any information of any kind, nature or description concerning any matters affecting or relating to activities of Chevron or Chevron's System.

17. Tools of Trade. Chevron agrees to provide the Certified Operators the tools, equipment and materials, at Chevron's System, reasonably necessary as determined by the Certified Operator(s) in order for TOR and its Certified Operators to fulfill its and their duties under this Agreement.

18. Return of Files. To the extent authorized by law and the Division, upon termination of this Agreement, TOR shall promptly return to Chevron all materials, supplies, documents or other papers in its possession that are the property of Chevron.

19. Term. Notwithstanding the dates this Agreement is signed, the parties agree that this Agreement is effective as of date that TOR began providing the services of its Certified Operators to Chevron.

20. Notice of Termination. Either party may terminate this Agreement without cause being stated by delivery, via certified or registered U.S. Mail, of written notice with such termination to be effective no less than sixty (60) days after delivery of such notice.

21. Notices

- b. Other written notices, as provided for by other paragraphs and sections of this agreement may be sent by text message or email (if sent with a delivery receipt).

22. Arbitration. The parties hereby stipulate and agree that any and all disputes or disagreement relating to the interpretation of the content, extent, or applicability of this Agreement or any claims by either party against the other relating to any of the duties, services, invoices, payments or other matters reasonably arising out of this Agreement shall be immediately arbitrated, pursuant to the following:

- a. By executing this Agreement, the Parties consent to the venue and jurisdiction of any dispute

resolution proceeding in Rio Blanco County, State of Colorado, or such other venue that is mutually agreed upon by the Parties.

- b. In no event shall a demand for arbitration be made after the date when the institution of legal or equitable proceedings based on the claim would be barred by the applicable statute of limitations. For statute of limitations purposes, receipt of a written demand for arbitration by the person or entity administering the arbitration shall constitute the institution of legal or equitable proceedings based on the claim.
- c. Either party may submit any dispute between the parties to an arbitrator to resolve the dispute.
- d. If the parties cannot agree on an arbitrator within ten business days of written notice of a dispute having been given to the other party (the "Dispute Notice"), each party shall provide written notice to the other party of the name of a nominee (the "Nominee Notice") to serve as the arbitrator.
- e. If the parties cannot agree to select one of the two names provided in the Nominee Notices within fifteen business days of the Dispute Notice, the parties' nominees shall themselves pick a third, agreed-upon arbitrator who will then serve to hear the dispute.
- f. The parties agree that a proper arbitrator for this Agreement must be either an attorney licensed in Colorado, or a retired Colorado County or District court judge, or another person with equivalent technical expertise and experience.
- g. The arbitrator shall establish such rules and procedures as s/he determines are fair, economical and conducive to reaching a fair and reasonable decision.
- h. The arbitrator's decisions as to rules and procedures and his/her final decision(s) shall be final and not appealable. The arbitration costs shall be borne by the parties as determined by the arbitrator; however, the arbitrator shall be guided by the principle that the prevailing party shall be entitled to receive from the other party reasonable expenses, attorneys' fees, and costs.

22. Illegal Aliens – Public Contracts for Services. Chevron certifies that Chevron shall comply with the provisions of Section 8-17.5-101, *et seq.*, C.R.S. Chevron shall not knowingly employ or contract with an illegal alien to perform work under this Agreement or enter into an agreement with a subcontractor that knowingly employs or contracts with an illegal alien. Chevron represents, warrants, and agrees that it (a) has verified that it does not employ any illegal aliens, through participation in the Basic Pilot Employment Verification Program administered by the Social Security Administration and Department of Homeland Security, or (b) otherwise will comply with the requirements of Section 8-17.5-101(2)(b)(I), C.R.S. Chevron shall use Basic Pilot Program

Procedures to undertake pre-employment screening of job applicants while this contract is being performed. If Chevron obtains actual knowledge that any of its subcontractors performing work arising out of this Agreement knowingly employs or contracts with an illegal alien, Chevron shall: (i) notify the subcontractor and TOR *within three* days that Chevron has actual knowledge that its subcontractor is employing or contracting with an illegal alien; and (ii) terminate the subcontract with the subcontractor if within three days of receiving such notice, the subcontractor does not stop employing or contracting with the illegal alien, unless the subcontractor provides information to establish that the subcontractor has not knowingly employed or contracted with an illegal alien. Chevron shall comply with all reasonable requests made in the course of an investigation by the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment. If Chevron fails to comply with any requirement of this provision or Section 8-17.5-101, *et seq.*, C.R.S., TOR may terminate this Agreement for breach and Chevron shall be liable for actual and consequential damages to TOR.

23. Non-Solicitation of TOR Employees. During the term of this Agreement and for a period of two (2) years thereafter, Chevron will not, either on its own behalf or that of another person, firm or corporation, solicit for employment or as an independent contractor performing Certified Operator services, any TOR Certified Operators who were employed during the term of this Agreement.
24. Other Provisions. The Parties further acknowledge and agree to the follow material provisions of this agreement:
- a. They have carefully read this entire Agreement and have consulted satisfactorily with legal counsel as they deem appropriate, know the contents hereof, and sign this Agreement voluntarily, personally understanding all consequences and effects.
 - b. This Agreement, including all documents referenced and contemplated hereunder, represents the entire agreement among the Parties. No additional promise or agreement has been made as consideration for this Agreement, and the signing hereof has not been induced by any representations which are not fully set forth in this Agreement.
 - c. The Parties represent and warrant that they have not assigned, transferred, sold, or hypothecated any claims against each other to any other person or entity.
 - d. All promises, obligations, duties and representations made or contained in this Agreement shall survive the termination and expiration of this Agreement.
 - e. This Agreement binds each party and any successors and assigns of a party and shall inure to the benefit of each party and their successors and assigns.
 - f. This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, and it shall not be necessary in making proof of this Agreement to account for more than one counterpart. Facsimile and electronic signatures shall be binding.
 - g. This Agreement and its interpretation shall be governed by the laws of the State of Colorado. Any disputes arising hereunder shall be arbitrated or litigated in the County of Rio Blanco, and State of Colorado, as the exclusive venue for any such proceeding.
 - h. The rule that ambiguities in agreements shall be construed against the drafter shall have no application to this Agreement; the parties stipulate that each has participated in the drafting hereof to the extent deemed necessary by the respective party.

SUBJECT: Preliminary Congressional Plan

Summary

This memorandum and attachments provide context and information about the preliminary congressional redistricting map (preliminary plan) submitted by the Colorado Independent Congressional Redistricting Commission's (commission) nonpartisan commission staff (staff) on June 23, 2021.

Plan



Attachment A provides detailed maps of the preliminary plan.

Data Overview

The commission approved a data set to allow staff to prepare the preliminary plan. Because the U.S. Census Bureau will not release the official redistricting data until August 2021, the commission decided that proceeding with preliminary data gives the commission the best chance of completing their work and receiving valuable feedback without delaying the 2022 election calendar.

Staff created the data set using data from the Colorado State Demography Office and using the recently released state resident population from the U.S. Census Bureau as a benchmark. The state resident population, as released by the U.S. Census Bureau, is 5,773,714. The preliminary data comes from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey and state population forecasts, and the data's distribution is based on the U.S. Census Bureau's Master Address File.

Staff prepared the preliminary plan using 2010 census blocks. This means the geometry used in the preliminary plan does not align exactly with the 2020 census blocks that will be used for the final maps. When the U.S. Census Bureau releases the full block-level redistricting data in August, staff will prepare maps for the commission using this final data on 2020 census blocks.

Constitutional Requirements

Section 44.3 of Article V of the Colorado Constitution requires the commission to adopt a redistricting plan that satisfies several criteria. These criteria are addressed below.

1. Precise Mathematical Population Equality

The Colorado Constitution requires the commission to make "a good-faith effort to achieve precise mathematical population equality between districts."¹ Mathematical population equality is also required by article XIV, section 2 of the U.S. Constitution, which states that "[r]epresentatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers. . . ."² The Supreme Court of the United States has held that the language in article XIV, section 2 of the U.S. Constitution, means that congressional districts in the same state must be as nearly equal in population as practicable.³ Therefore, the preliminary plan must come as close as possible to achieving equal population among the districts. The commission must justify any variance in population in the proposed congressional districts, no matter how small.⁴

Per the 2020 decennial census, Colorado has a population of 5,773,714 and was allotted a total of eight congressional districts. Thus, the target population of each proposed Colorado congressional district in the preliminary plan is 721,714.⁵

The preliminary plan achieves as close to "precise mathematical population equality" as possible. The total population of Colorado does not divide evenly into eight congressional

districts. Therefore, the proposed congressional districts in the preliminary plan cannot all meet the target population. However, the largest deviation from the target population in any district is one person. Attachment B provides a population summary of the eight proposed congressional districts in the preliminary plan.

2. Contiguity

Congressional districts must be contiguous.⁶ This means that all parts of a district must be connected, and it must be possible to travel to all parts of a district without ever leaving it.⁷ The preliminary plan achieves contiguity because the entire area of each individual proposed congressional district is connected.

3. Voting Rights Act

The Colorado Constitution requires the commission to comply with the Voting Rights Act (VRA) in creating a congressional redistricting plan.⁸ The VRA prohibits a state from enacting a redistricting plan that "results in a denial or abridgement of the right of any citizen of the United States to vote on account of race or color" or because a person is "a member of a language minority group."⁹ "Denial or abridgement" has been defined to include any procedure, including redistricting, that diminishes the ability of any citizen to elect their preferred candidate on account of race, color, or membership in a language minority.¹⁰

Section 2 of the VRA is the section that would most likely apply to redistricting in Colorado.¹¹ A violation of Section 2 may be established if:

*based on the totality of circumstances, it is shown that the political processes leading to nomination or election in the State or political subdivision are not equally open to participation by members of ... [a racial, color, or language minority class] ... in that its members have less opportunity than other members of the electorate to participate in the political process and to elect representatives of their choice.*¹²

Staff considered the VRA in drafting the preliminary plan. The Supreme Court of the United States found in *Thornburg v. Gingles* that three preconditions to a VRA Section 2 violation must be met to state a claim.¹³ "First, the minority group must be able to demonstrate that it is sufficiently large and geographically compact to constitute a majority in a single-member district."¹⁴ Staff is not certain that it is possible to draw a district where a minority group "is sufficiently large and geographically compact to constitute a majority."¹⁵ However, for purposes of this analysis, staff assumes that the first precondition is satisfied.

The second precondition is that the minority group "show that it is politically cohesive."¹⁶ Such a showing would require that a VRA expert examine the voting patterns of the minority group. Even without this expert examination, staff assumes that the second precondition is met for the purposes of this analysis.

The third and final precondition is that the "the minority must be able to demonstrate that the white majority votes sufficiently as a bloc to enable it...to defeat the minority's preferred candidate."¹⁷ Such a showing would require that a VRA expert analyze whether the majority voted as a bloc enabling it to defeat preferred minority candidates. Staff examined the area in which a potential minority majority district could be drawn. This potential district would include large areas of Denver, eastern Jefferson County, and western Adams County and Arapahoe County. All three of those areas have elected Democratic congressional representatives. Hence, staff does not believe that the majority is defeating the minorities' candidates of choice. Furthermore, courts have interpreted the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution as prohibiting drawing districts predominately on the basis of race, unless compliance with the VRA is required.¹⁸

Attachment B provides information about race and ethnicity within each proposed congressional district in the preliminary plan.

4. Communities of Interest

The Colorado Constitution requires the commission, as much as is reasonably possible, to preserve whole "communities of interest."¹⁹ The constitution defines "community of interest" as "any group in Colorado that shares one or more substantial interests that may be the subject of federal legislative action, is composed of a reasonably proximate population, and thus should be considered for inclusion within a single district for purposes of ensuring its fair and effective representation."²⁰ The constitution provides examples of shared public policy concerns, including those of:

- agricultural areas;
- education issues;
- employment issues;
- environmental issues;
- industrial areas;
- public health issues;
- rural areas;
- trade areas;
- transportation issues;
- urban areas;
- water needs and supplies; and
- issues of demonstrable regional significance.²¹

In defining communities of interest, the constitution states that groups that "may comprise a community of interest include racial, ethnic, and language minority groups," but do not

include groups with "relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates."²²

Staff received approximately 900 public comments between March 12, 2021, and June 13, 2021, many of which address communities of interest. Attachment C summarizes the public comments that staff received and considered in drawing the preliminary plan.

5. Political Subdivisions

The Colorado Constitution requires the commission, as much as is reasonably possible, to preserve "whole political subdivisions, such as counties, cities, and towns."²³

The only counties that staff split into separate proposed congressional districts in the preliminary plan are the more populous counties along the Front Range. Boulder County has the smallest population of any county split into multiple proposed congressional districts by the preliminary plan, and Boulder County contains over 300,000 people.

Some cities and towns are in multiple counties. Generally, staff tried to keep these cities and towns in a single proposed congressional district, even if that meant splitting a county into multiple congressional districts. Staff did not keep such cities and towns in single congressional districts, at the expense of dividing counties into multiple proposed congressional districts, in two circumstances.

The first instance is where a portion of a city or town contains no population in a county. Cities and towns that are in multiple counties and have no population in at least one of the counties in which they are situated include Superior and Central City.

The second instance is where the majority of a city or town is situated in one county and there is a portion of the city or town that contains a very small population situated in a different county. Keeping such a city or town whole would require a county clerk to create a precinct composed of just that small population of the city or town in the county. It is possible that such a small precinct would not allow the votes cast in such precincts to be kept private. Examples of cities and towns situated in one county with portions of the city or town containing a very small population situated in a different county include Green Mountain Falls that has a population of only 28 persons in Teller County, Bow Mar that has a population of 277 people in Jefferson County, and Littleton that has a population of 28 people in Jefferson County.

Attachment D shows the counties, cities, and towns included in each congressional district, and notes those that staff split in the preliminary plan.

6. Compactness

The Colorado Constitution requires the commission to create districts that are as "compact as is reasonably possible" and staff considered compactness in drafting the preliminary plan.²⁴ There are various mathematical formulas for comparing compactness.

One measure of compactness is the Reock score.²⁵ A Reock score measures the compactness of a district by comparing the area of a district to the area of the smallest possible circle that could enclose the district's geometry. A district's Reock score can fall between zero and one, with a score closer to one indicating a more compact district.

Another measure of compactness is the Polsby-Popper score.²⁶ This score compares the area of the district to the area of a circle with a circumference equal in length to the perimeter of the district. As with a Reock Score, a Polsby-Popper score can fall between zero and one, with a score closer to one indicating a more compact district.

Staff chose to use both the Reock score and the Polsby-Popper score to analyze each district's compactness in the preliminary plan. Attachment E provides the Reock and Polsby-Popper scores for each proposed congressional district in the preliminary plan. These scores will be more useful when examining multiple proposed plans.

After attempting to satisfy the requirements that are constitutionally required to be prioritized over compactness, staff drafted a preliminary plan that is "as compact as reasonably possible."²⁷

7. Competitive Districts

The Colorado Constitution requires the commission, having met the requirements described above, "to the extent possible, [to] maximize the number of politically competitive districts."²⁸ The constitution defines competitiveness for this purpose as "having a reasonable potential for the party affiliation of the district's representative to change at least once between federal decennial censuses."²⁹ The constitution further specifies that "[c]ompetitiveness may be measured by factors such as a proposed district's past election results, a proposed district's political party registration data, and evidence-based analyses of proposed districts."³⁰

For the consideration of a proposed district's past election results, Attachment F provides the results from the 2018 Attorney General's race for each district in the preliminary plan. The 2018 Attorney General's election was the closest statewide election during the most recent non-presidential general election year. The qualities of that election make it a helpful election in measuring the competitiveness of the proposed districts in the preliminary plan because it is the most competitive recent race with statewide voting data.

For a proposed district's political party registration, Attachment F provides voter registration data for each district in the preliminary plan.

Due to the preliminary nature of the data staff used to draft the preliminary plan and the fact that the competitiveness of districts has the lowest constitutional priority of the factors that must be considered in drafting the preliminary plan, staff did not prioritize the competitiveness of the districts in the preliminary plan.

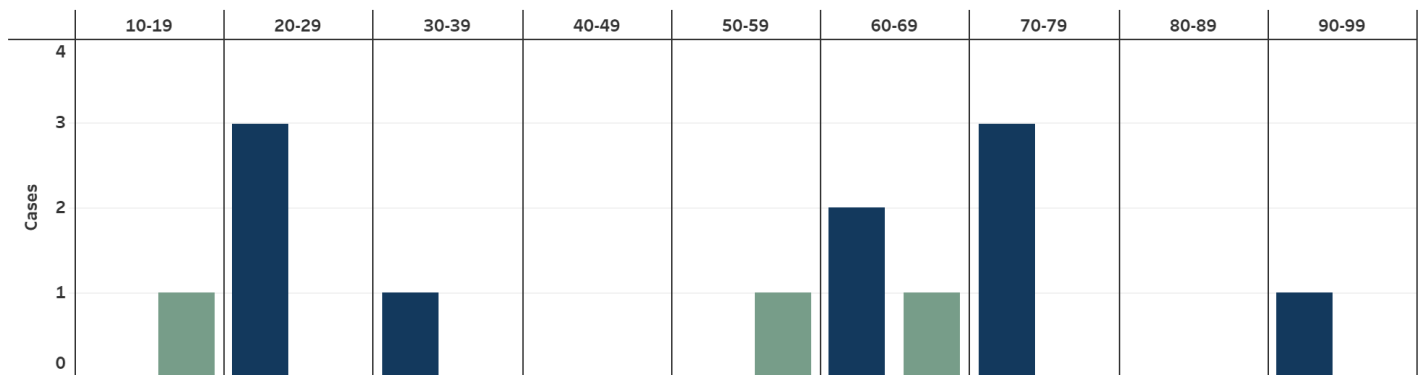

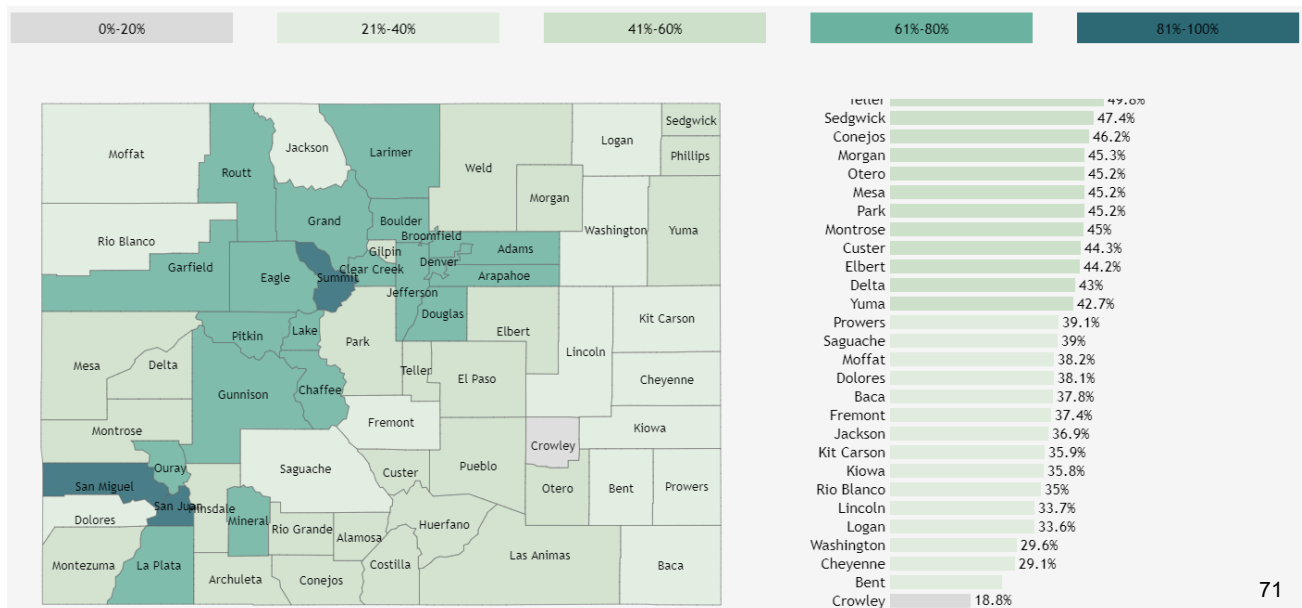

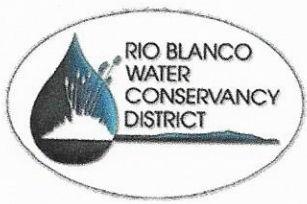
RE: Colorado Drought Contingency Plan - Demand Management

Dear Honored Member of the Colorado Water Conservation Board of Directors

The Rio Blanco Water Conservancy District (RBWCD) would like to say it is a pleasure to provide comment on Demand Management however recognizing our present state of drought and continued aridification this is proving to push a level of conversation not many are fully prepared for nor comfortable with. There is more gratifying task we all would rather be doing in our water world but here we are today in our drought-stricken region formulating a plan for a better tomorrow. Evidently all of us were chosen in one fashion or another to be part of this crucial topic in preparation for our future generation's water security. Changing times for sure.

The winds of change are upon us, and we recognize the need for adaption to our changing environment. Being such, the RBWCD believes it is imperative for the CWCB to understand the function of the White River Basin with respect to Drought Contingency Planning (DCP) - Demand Management (DM). We believe no other Colorado water basin in our great state functions as we do nor has done so for such an extend period.

Our White River community is cultivated around areas of alluvial gravel deposits that have been washed out from the Flat Tops and high desert plains over the millennium recharged by snow, rains, and flood irrigation. The combination of these is what keeps the water available for our community needs. With the reduction in snowpack and seasonal rains not to forget increased temperatures, this has impacted our ability to put water to full beneficial use due to the lack of directly available supply from the stream or retiming of water while also reducing the alluvium storage.



Under normal years with average precipitation, flood irrigation plays an immense role “topping-off” our White River alluvial aquifers but with the loss of direct flows and seasonal precipitation less water is available to be applied shorting the alluvial aquifer storage not to forget the natural recharge occurrence which our White River basin is dependent upon. Once the alluvium is full water eventually migrates back to the stream as return flows for other later in the season beneficial water reuse. Typical return flow season is from late summer to late winter months.

For DM discussion purposes, the White River basin has: 2 municipalities, Meeker (ground water supply) and Rangely (direct diversion surface water supply) supporting a population of about 6,400 citizens; limited industry that continues to be sequestered; recreation; and agriculture. A DM program imposed upon the municipalities will have limited conserved consumptive use with the small population, industrial water use is an incredibly small quantity, recreation is non-consumptive, so that leaves agriculture to take care of the lion’s share of water for a White River DM program. As the DM program is rolling out with uncertain side boards, we must presume any Conserved Consumptive Use will be primarily sacrificed by agriculture which is the life blood of our basin hydrology. Take away or restrict flood irrigation and we eat away at the primary drought insurance policy of our community and stream ecology shorting alluvial recharge and return flows, which has been encountered during previous drought-stricken years.

Unlike other Colorado basin’s, the White River is void of any real storage for drought or contingency protections hence part of the purpose and need for RBWCD along Yellow Jacket Water Conservancy District, Town of Rangely, and Rio Blanco County to aggressively push for Wolf Creek Reservoir. Our community is progressing with our Drought Contingency Plan that includes physical storage because we understand the vulnerability to our present system and how storage provides water user flexibility. White River constituents currently face an imminent municipal, agricultural, environmental, and economic catastrophe without a resilient water supply then add DM on top of our already tasked and limited water resources? The picture is grim for our community to say the very least. What happens to our towns if there is over conservation as part of a DM program and our water supply is eliminated or injuriously reduced due to the dry up of agriculture or another DM alternative? Where do we turn to then to carry us through these water short times? Critical storage is not here yet and as DM is evolving there will become more need and reliance upon storage. We ask, what are the states

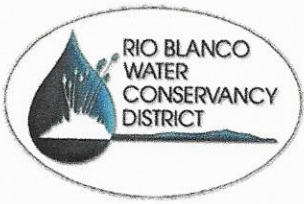


plans to carry our district water needs through when water is already past the state line as part of a state Drought Contingency Plan and basins lack critical components for drought resiliency?

By keeping water in the stream and out of our alluvium by reducing flood irrigation what affect will this have upon stream ecology or the threatened and endangers fishes that reside here later in the season with reduced alluvium storage and return flows? What happens to the considerable investments made for the protection and recovery of our threatened and endangered species or recreational fishery species? Modeling completed for the White River demonstrates low to no stream flow risk to be very real.

Proponents for a DM program express climate change as a purpose and need for such a program yet are they taking into consideration the impacts to drying areas up removing green belts from playing a roll in carbon sequestration and the associated atmospheric cooling these areas provide? Perhaps in place of drying areas up we should be wetting areas using the plants and soils for what they have to offer. How does a browned pasture or field aid or play into a warming climate? Are we treating a symptom as opposed to implementing part of a cure by not wetting and activating these carbon bioreactors?

Part of the DM discussion includes conserved water to be stored downstream in Lake Powell. The district finds this approach unique since once the water has exited Colorado the multiple beneficial uses of our precious resource are no longer possible to Colorado water users. Has the state completed a Cost/Benefit analysis quantifying the benefits to our state by keeping the conserved consumptive use within our borders? Our analysis has shown the financial benefits keeping water within our basin with the short list detailing; increased economic diversity, healthier municipalities, greater agriculture security, more recreation, stronger healthier stream ecology, and increased carbon sequestration. The White River, while not having formal representation to the DM framework development, is unaware of any attempt by the state to quantify such an analysis. Seeing this, the RWBCD recommends the state quantify these benefits as part of the DM process in a truly representative, open, and transparent means without prejudice including entities or individuals having a truly vested stake in any DM program. This includes entities statutorily created for water conservation such as water conservancy and conservation districts who have additional concepts for DM yet not part of the conversation.

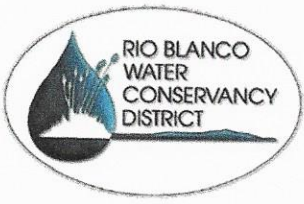


"The Colorado Water Conservation Board's mission is to conserve, develop, protect, and manage Colorado's water for present and future generations." We understand and agree with this complex mission also realizing the state has a legal obligation to meet the Colorado River Compact. Not a simple task. In the instance of DCP and DM is the state truly looking for the wellbeing of our White River community? We see DM evolving around continued or expanded trans-mountain diversions, restrict less-developed basins/regions, and benefit the lower Colorado River basin states all of which is related to in the DM Framework.

Through a public process created by HOUSE BILL 05-1177 "COLORADO WATER FOR THE 21ST CENTURY ACT" the Yampa-White-Green Basin Round Table unanimously created seven (7) Principles specific to Demands Management. The RBWCD believes these principles are important and MUST be an essential part of any DM program. The principles are:

1. *Preservation of Quality of Life in the Y/W/G River Basin: Any DM program must preserve and enhance all aspects of quality of life in our basin, including agriculture, local communities, and local economies, while protecting municipal delivery, addressing environmental needs as well as recreational water use, and offering locally-accepted methods to reduce consumptive use without injury.*
2. *Equity of Responsibility and Opportunity: A DM program must be structured to ensure that no river basin nor single water user group (i.e, Ag, M&I) bears a disproportionate share of DM responsibility, and to provide opportunities for all water right holders to participate on a reasonably-equitable basis. To ensure equity, some form of inter-basin apportionment is required.*
3. *Guided Market: The State of Colorado should establish a marketplace for DM water transactions that is equitable and transparent.*
4. *Rural Communities: Any DM program must evaluate and address all impacts that could result to rural communities, including negative economic, cultural, or social impacts.*
5. *Recreation and Environment: Any DM program must consider/analyze its impacts on environmental and recreational needs, including those resulting from changes in water supply and/or timing of flows. Any DM program should strive to benefit, and must not adversely impact, environmental and recreational water uses and their contributions to local economies.*
6. *Compensation for Value of Water Conserved: Any DM program must fairly compensate participants. Compensation should be based on all economic impacts to the participant and not solely on the loss of income from the crop or product not produced.*



7. *Trans-Mountain Diversions (TMDs): Basins which benefit from water diverted from the Upper Colorado River must be considered as part of the CRS, with applicable DM responsibilities and opportunities, and subject to equitable apportionment for DM purposes. Any DM program must prohibit trans-mountain diverters from purchasing Western Slope water to meet a DM responsibility.*

The Rio Blanco Water Conservancy District unequivocally believes in water conservation and the overlaying rationale for DM but we question the looming injury such a program will have to our basin water users. We continue progressing our locally driven drought planning efforts that includes considerable water conservation imploring upon the CWCB and other state water agencies part of the DM development framework to keep the intricacies and lack of drought resiliency of our White River community in mind as the states DCP evolves. We must reiterate, significant desire to participate in a DM type program is evident in our White River basin however, we lack critical tools necessary for drought and over conservation resiliency. Basin storage is a vital component of our drought planning and must be part of any successful DM program.
