Susan has been deep cleaning the commons area as well as shampooing carpets. Doorbells have been installed for all residents. Still requiring residents to social distance. Finished a 3-year audit. Janet report that she processed 3 liquor renewals and 1 special events permit. Main street is looking great with the flowers. The bump outs have been finished and look great.
 - b. *Michael Dillion* – Michael reported on the water line project. He stated that the project was 80% complete. The tie in was completed on August 11th will no problems and no boil order had to be issued. There is still one more tie in at Hwy 64 and Hwy 139. The project will not meet the September 5th deadline but should be completed a little time after. Don also was present to report current river levels. Currently the flow is at 110csf and is a little hard to maintain the process. There are no water restrictions as of right now but will impose them if the river flow drops to 80csfs. The water department is cleaning screens once a day every 2-3 days.

1. Call to Order – 6:08pm

2. Roll Call – Andy Shaffer, Trey Robie, Alisa Granger, Keely Ellis all present. Rich Garner present via phone. Tyson Hacking and Luke Geer absent.

3. Purpose of Special Council Meeting

- a. *Discussion and Action to approve Rio Blanco County Resolution to approve a Ballot Question for the November 2020 Election proposing an increase to the existing countywide sales tax rate to address critical and urgent needs of the Rio Blanco County Dispatch Center and Rangely Dispatch Center as more particularly described withing the proposed resolution. 2020-___ - Rio Blanco County dispatches for Meeker PD, Meeker Fire Department, and their ambulance. Rangely dispatch, dispatches for Rangely PD, Rangely Fire and Rangely EMS. In order for the 1% increase the Board of County Commissioners and Rangely and Meeker Town Councils have to approve it to go on the voter's ballot in November and the deadline to get the question on the ballot is September 4th, 2020. Many conversations have been discussed on how the money would be split from the sales tax increase and it is still unsure. It costs Rangely dispatch \$347,753 to operate and it costs Rio Blanco County dispatch \$527,632 to operate. There was a conversation that said that there was a possibility that Rio Blanco County may eliminate Rio Blanco County dispatch. The commissioner then held a meeting to discuss this and other budget cuts. The public showed their presence and indicated that they do not want Rio Blanco County dispatch to be eliminated. The commissioners stated that Colorado State Patrol out of Craig could dispatch for them at the cost of \$70,000 per year and that cost was only to dispatch for the Sherriff's Department. If Meeker PD and Fire Department were to be included, it would cost more. The question has been put in front of the Town Council to sign the Resolution to increase the sales tax by 1%, it takes both Towns and County to approve it, to get on the ballot. This money can only be used for dispatch. Lisa indicated that they had revised the Resolution to be a Resolution and then an IGA which would then describe the actual agreement between all three entities. The ballot question was also put in. In the most recent IGA, they had proposed a 70/30 split but when talking to the commissioners they indicated more of a 50/50 split. Andy stated that he believes that we need a dispatch center. Mercy stated how calls for the county are handled. If Rangely dispatch receives a call that is in the county and it involves Rangely Fire or*

Rangely EMS, Rangely keeps the call and dispatches fully. If there is a call that is law enforcement wise, for example a stranded motorist on Hwy 139, the call is transferred to them and they dispatch the call. Rangely dispatch does not dispatch Rio Blanco County Sherriff's just Fire and EMS which usually those calls are out in the county. Lisa stated that there will be a joint meeting on September 22; both 911 boards, both Police Departments, Sherriff's office, Craig dispatch to discuss the pro and cons. Tonight's decision is to decide whether to vote on the sales tax increase and if so, what are the terms that will be accepted. Keely indicated that she would entertain the idea of Rangely taking on the dispatch center. Ti stated that they would be interested and capable to handle the call volume. Ti also said that he would not want to see people lose their job but if the opportunity presented itself, they would be happy to take that on. Keely stated that she did not feel that there was enough research done on this issue in 3 days to be presented to the Council to be put on the ballot. Trey stated that they have not shown enough cuts to justify the sales tax increase. Trey asked Mercy and Ti to start running numbers to see what it would take dispatch for each entity and if there were multiple entities. Mercy indicated that Rangely dispatch does not want to see Rio Blanco County dispatch to be disbanded, but Rangely dispatch is there if needed. Rangely dispatch doesn't want to see that happen. The Council agreed that they do not want to see that happen either because of the safety of the citizens.

Motion was made by Trey Robie to not approve Rio Blanco County Resolution and/or IGA to approve a Ballot Question for the November 2020 Election proposing an increase to the existing countywide sales tax rate of 1% to address critical and urgent needs of the Rio Blanco County Dispatch Center and Rangely Dispatch Center as more particularly described withing the proposed resolution. 2020-____ and RBC IGA, second by Keely Ellis.

**INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT CONCERNING THE IMPOSITION,
DISTRIBUTION AND USE OF A SALES TAX PRIMARILY FOR THE RIO BLANCO
COUNTY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER**

COMES NOW, The Board of County Commissioners of Rio Blanco County, Colorado, the Town of Meeker, Colorado and the Town of Rangely Colorado and state and agree as follows:

WHEREAS, the Parties are authorized by Article XIV, Section 18 of the Colorado Constitution and Section 29-1-203, C.R.S., as amended, to contract with each other to provide for joint funding and cooperation regarding services and functions which each is otherwise lawfully authorized to provide; and

WHEREAS, at the inception of the 2021 budget process for Rio Blanco County the Board of County Commissioners were considering options to save funds including the possible outsourcing the dispatch services; and,

WHEREAS, a number of citizens of Rio Blanco County including representatives of the Town of Rangely and the Town of Meeker encouraged the Board of County Commissioners to maintain the Rio Blanco Communications Center and to approach the voters with a proposed sales tax to fund the Rio Blanco Communications Center; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Rangely, Town of Meeker and Rio Blanco County desire to enter into an agreement for the imposition of a new sales tax and the allocation of funds that would be generated thereby.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the joint and mutual promises contained herein and other good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto state and agree as follows:

1. GENERAL MATTERS.

- a. Purpose: The purpose of this Agreement is to allow for the sharing of tax revenue between the City and the Towns with the intent to maintain dispatch services within Rio Blanco County.
- b. Tax Subject to this Agreement: The tax that is the subject of the agreement is the sales tax including applicable penalties and interest and levied, collected and enforced in accordance with Resolution No. 20- ____ which is attached hereto, Marked as Exhibit "A". (hereinafter, the "2021SalesTax").

2. SUBMISSION OF BALLOT QUESTION. Exhibit A, a resolution of the Board of County Commissioners of Rio Blanco County (“BoCC”) submits to the electorate of Rio Blanco County a ballot question imposing a sales tax of \$0.01 on transactions within Rio Blanco County (“RBC”). The Town of Rangely (“TOR”) and the Town of Meeker (“TOM”) agree to support the Ballot question and if successful, to implement the sales tax as herein set forth.
3. DISTRIBUTION AND USE OF PROCEEDS.
 - a. Rangely. TOR shall use the proceeds generated by the 2021SalesTax from sales within their municipal boundaries for the exclusive purpose of providing dispatch or similar services.
 - b. Meeker. TOM shall use the proceeds generated by the 2021SalesTax from sales within their municipal boundaries for the exclusive purpose of providing dispatch or similar services which for TOM, shall be accomplished by paying its share of revenue generated by the 2021SalesTax to RBC to offset the costs of funding the Rio Blanco Communications Center.
 - c. County. RBC shall use seventy percent (70%) of the revenue generated by 2021SalesTax in unincorporated Rio Blanco County to fund the Rio Blanco Communications Center. RBC shall pay the remaining thirty percent (30%) of tax revenue generated by 2021SalesTax in unincorporated Rio Blanco County to TOR which funds TOR agrees to exclusively use for the exclusive purpose of providing dispatch or similar services.
4. TERM, TERMINATION AND PRIORITY. This agreement shall be effective upon execution and shall continue through December 2035. If the parties fail to amend, renew or otherwise extend this Agreement prior to its termination, then the Agreement shall continue to be in full force and effect on an annual basis thereafter. In the event that there is an inconsistency between this Agreement and the Ballot Issue, then this Agreement shall control as to the method and manner of distribution.
5. DISTRIBUTION. Each party acknowledges that the State of Colorado collects sales tax and that it is distributed two (2) months in arrears to RBC and that the Colorado Department Of Revenue (“DOR”) will distribute the revenue generated hereby to RBC and RBC will provide timely accounting of all funds received and distributed to TOR and TOM
6. OTHER.
 - a. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements, representation, and understandings between them. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced according to the laws of the State of Colorado. No alterations, amendments, changes or modifications to this Agreement shall be valid unless they are contained in writing and executed by all the Parties with the same formality as this Agreement.

- b. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties to it and their respective legal representatives, successors, and assigns. Any delegation or assignment of this Agreement by either Party without the prior written consent of the other Party shall be void. The subject headings of the paragraphs of this Agreement are included for purposes of convenience only and shall not affect the construction or interpretation of its provisions.
- c. Except as set forth elsewhere in this paragraph, all notices to be given in this Agreement shall be made in writing and shall be sufficient if delivered personally due to the need for timely transmission of information or by Certified Mail to the other party at the following addresses:

- d. The Parties shall implement this Agreement in good faith including acting in good faith in all matters that require joint or coordinated action.
- e. The Parties will perform their duties under this Agreement independent from each other. Neither Party, nor any employee, officer, or agent thereof, will be considered to be an agent or employee of the other Party for any purpose whatsoever.
- f. Enforcement of the terms of the Agreement and all rights of action relating to enforcement are strictly reserved to the Parties. Nothing contained in the Agreement gives or allows any claim or right of action to any third person or entity. Any person or entity other than the City or County receiving services or benefits pursuant to the Agreement is an incidental beneficiary only.
- g. This Agreement, including the exhibits attached hereto (each of which is specifically incorporated herein), is intended as the complete integration of all understandings between the Parties. No prior contemporaneous or subsequent

addition, deletion, or other amendment hereto shall have any force or effect unless embodied herein in writing and executed in the same manner as this Agreement. No subsequent novation, renewal, addition, deletion or other amendment hereto shall have any force or effect unless embodied in a written amendatory or other Agreement properly executed by the Parties. No oral representation by either party at variance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement or any written amendment to this Agreement shall have any force or effect or bind the Parties. Amendments to this Agreement will become effective when approved by both Parties and executed in the same manner as this Agreement. This Agreement and any amendments shall be binding upon the Parties, their successors and assigns.

- h. The Parties assure that they possess the legal authority, pursuant to any proper, appropriate and official motion, resolution or action passed or taken, to enter into this Agreement. The person or persons signing and executing this Agreement do hereby warrant that he/she or they have been fully authorized to execute this Agreement and to validly and legally bind their principals to all the terms, performances and provisions herein set forth. Each Party shall have the right, at its option, to either temporarily suspend or permanently terminate this Agreement, if there is a bona fide dispute as to the legal authority of any person signing the Agreement to enter into this Agreement.
- i. This Agreement is expressly made subject to the limitations of the Colorado Constitution. Nothing herein shall constitute, nor deemed to constitute, the creation of a debt or multi-year fiscal obligation or an obligation of future appropriations by any party hereto, contrary to Article X, § 20 Colorado Constitution or any other constitutional, statutory or charter debt limitation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, with respect to any financial obligation which may arise under this Agreement in any fiscal year after 2020, in the event the budget or other means of appropriations for any such year fails to provide funds in sufficient amounts to discharge such obligation, such failure shall not constitute a default or breach of this Agreement, including any sub-agreement, attachment, schedule, or exhibit thereto.

RESOLUTION NO. 2020-_____

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF RIO BLANCO COUNTY, COLORADO TO APPROVE AND AUTHORIZE A BALLOT QUESTION FOR THE NOVEMBER 2020 COORDINATED ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROPOSING AN INCREASE TO THE EXISTING COUNTYWIDE SALES TAX RATE TO ADDRESS CRITICAL AND URGENT NEEDS OF THE RIO BLANCO COUNTY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER AND RANGELY DISPATCH CENTER AS MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED WITHIN THE PROPOSED RESOLUTION.

WHEREAS, C.R.S. §29-2-101, *et. seq.* authorizes the County to levy an increase in the countywide sales tax rate upon approval of the majority of qualified registered electors of the County voting on such proposal at an election conducted and held according to Colorado law; and

WHEREAS, the Rio Blanco County Communications Center provides dispatch services for the Rio Blanco County Sheriff's Office, the Town of Meeker Police Department and the Eastern Rio Blanco County Fire District; and

WHEREAS, the Rangely Dispatch Center provides dispatch services for the Town of Rangely, the Rangely District Hospital EMS and the Western Rio Blanco County Fire District; and

WHEREAS, due to significant revenue shortfalls and financial burdens, it is no longer feasible to fund the Rio Blanco County Communications Center and Town of Rangely Dispatch Center through General Fund Balances; and

WHEREAS, the passage of this measure ensures that the Rio Blanco County Communications Center and the Town of Rangely Dispatch Center will have the funding needed to provide continued dispatch services as well as appropriate equipment for staff at the Rio Blanco County Communications Center and Town of Rangely Dispatch Center; and

WHEREAS, the proposed one cent per dollar (\$.01) sales tax increase in this measure is temporary and will expire on December 31, 2035; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Rio Blanco County finds that the imposition of a sales tax of one cent per dollar (\$.01) of taxable transactions will permit the County to utilize the revenues derived from these taxes for any and all expenditures related to touching upon or concerning the maintenance of communications and dispatching, facilities; and

WHEREAS, by separate resolution considered contemporaneously with the adoption of this Resolution the Board of County Commissioners will establish a separate fund to be known as the Dispatch Center Fund so that all revenue and expenditures related to the temporary tax increase imposed hereby will be more transparently accounted for and available for review by the general public; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Rio Blanco County finds that the imposition of a sales tax of one cent per dollar (\$.01) of taxable transactions will promote the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Rio Blanco County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Rio Blanco County:

1. Amendment. That Rio Blanco County Resolution Number 2001-13, be amended to provide for an increase in the Sales and Use Tax rate from three and six tenths percent (3.6%) to four and six tenths percent (4.6%).
2. Submission to Electors.
 - a. That this Sales and Use Tax increase proposal and resolution shall be referred to the registered electors of Rio Blanco County at the general election to be held on Tuesday, November 3, 2020. The question to be submitted to the registered electors at such election shall be as follows:

SHALL THE COUNTY OF RIO BLANCO COUNTY TAXES BE INCREASED \$992,527.00 ANNUALLY IN THE FIRST FULL FISCAL YEAR AND BY WHATEVER ADDITIONAL AMOUNTS ARE RAISED ANNUALLY IN EACH SUBSEQUENT YEAR, TO BENEFIT THE TOWNS OF RANGELY AND MEEKER AND THE COUNTY OF RIO BLANCO, AND IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, SHALL COUNTY RESOLUTION #01-13 BE AMENDED PROVIDING FOR AN INCREASE IN THE

SALES AND USE TAX RATE FROM 3.6 PERCENT TO 4.6 PERCENT, SUCH CHANGE TO BE IN EFFECT AS OF JANUARY 1, 2021, AND SHALL THE REVENUE CHANGE IN EVERY YEAR CAUSED BY SUCH INCREASED SALES AND USE TAX RATE APPROVED, PERMITTING ALL OF THE PROCEEDS OF SUCH INCREASE TO BE COLLECTED AND SPENT IN ANY YEAR WITHOUT LIMITATION OR CONDITION, AND WITHOUT LIMITING THE COLLECTION AND SPENDING OF ANY OTHER REVENUES OR FUNDS?

The County Clerk shall publish the text of this sales and use tax proposal and resolution four (4) separate times, a week apart, in the official newspaper of the County and each city and incorporated town within the County. The conduct of the election shall conform to the requirements of Article X, Section 20 of the Constitution of the State of Colorado and to the general election laws of the State.
3. Effective Date. It is hereby declared by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Rio Blanco, State of Colorado, that this proposal and resolution is necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and welfare, and that it shall become effective, if approved by a majority of the registered electors voting thereon, on the 1st day of January, 2021.

Ordinance 692 (2020)

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING AND REENACTING SECTION 10.14.030 OF THE RANGELY MUNICIPAL CODE, CLARIFYING AND AMENDING APPLICABLE SECTIONS, PROVIDING FOR OPERATOR CERTIFICATION BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE AND PROVIDING NEW PROVISIONS REQUIRING THAT PROTECTIVE HELMETS BE WORN BY OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE OPERATORS UNDER THE AGE OF EIGHTEEN

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rangely (“Council”) at its meeting on June 22, 2020 determined to schedule a public hearing to obtain public input concerning changes to Section 10.14.030 of the Rangely Municipal Code (“Code”), clarifying and amending existing provisions and adding requiring the use of protective helmets by underage operators (and their passengers) of off-highway vehicles (“OHV”s) within the Town of Rangely; and

WHEREAS, public hearings were held on September 8, 2020 and October 13, 2020 by the Council at the Rangely Town Hall with public notice thereof having been given in the Rio Blanco Herald Times newspaper on September 3, 2020 and October 1, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Council has duly considered the input given at such hearings by the public; and,

WHEREAS, based on the testimony received, the advice of Town staff and the experience of members of the Council, the Council

FINDS AND DETERMINES that it is in the best interests of the citizens, especially the minor citizens, of the Town that the following ordinance provisions be adopted, and that the facts contained below justify and mandate that changes be made to the applicable provisions of Town’ Municipal Code (“Code”), and that the wearing of helmets for minor operators and passengers are necessary, to wit:

1. Certain minor operators of off-highway vehicles should wear safety helmets while operating off-highway vehicles within the Town limits, as authorized by C.R.S. §42-4-1502.
2. The residents and citizens of the Town have had adequate opportunity to provide input, as required by law.
3. Protection of minor operators (and their passengers) of off-highway vehicles within the Town is in the best interests of the public health, safety, and welfare of the Town and citizens of the Town of Rangely.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES
OF THE TOWN OF RANGELY, COLORADO:**

- A. If any part of this ordinance is invalidated for any reason, it shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.
- B. This ordinance shall be effective thirty (30) days after publication following final passage.
- C. Section 10.14.030 of the Code is hereby amended so that it shall read in its entirety as follows:

10.14.030 Operation of Off-Highway Vehicles

- 1. It is a violation of this section 10.14.030 of the Code if a person under the age of ten (10) years operates an off-highway vehicle ("OHV") within the Town limits.
- 2. It is a violation of this section 10.14.030 of the Code if a person who is ten (10) years or older but less than sixteen (16) years old ("minor operator") operates an OHV on a off-highway vehicle route (as defined in section 10.14.020 of the Code) within the limits of the Town unless such minor operator is accompanied by and under the immediate supervision of a parent or a responsible person who is sixteen (16) years of age or older. The phrase "under immediate supervision" shall mean that, at a minimum, the minor operator is within close proximity of the parent or responsible person. A minor operator is presumed to not be "under immediate supervision" if the parent or responsible person is more than one hundred feet (100') distant from the minor operator while the minor is operating a OHV vehicle.
- 3. A minor operator of an OHV violates this section 10.14.030 if the minor operator:
 - a) Cannot physically place both feet firmly on the footrests of the OHV while seated on the OHV; or
 - b) Cannot physically place his or her fingers comfortably around the handlebars and brake levers when the handlebars of the OHV are turned to the maximum extent possible; or
 - c) Cannot physically stand on the OHV footrests with knees bent and with two inches (2") space between the buttocks of the minor operator and the OHV seat; or
 - d) Cannot physically and readily operate either the hand or foot brakes while seated on the OHV seat.
- 4. A minor operator of an OHV within the limits of the Town is in violation of this section 10.14.030 unless such minor operator has sufficient strength and familiarity to:
 - a) Squeeze, press or other control each braking system and foot and hand brake(s) of the OHV sufficiently to bring the OHV to a quick and controlled stop; and

- b) Operate the shift lever of the OHV; and
 - c) Operate each braking system and foot and hand brake of the OHV with sufficient pressure to hold the OHV still on a incline and decline of six degrees or more; and
 - d) Operate the brake and shift lever controls without looking at them; and
 - e) Signal stopping and turning with hand signals while the OHV is moving; and
 - f) Lock and unlock the parking brake.
5. The Chief of Police of the Town shall provide for one or more Colorado peace officers to train and or instruct minor operators of OHVs in a safety education and familiarization program (“SEFP”) approved by the Chief.
- a) No minor operator shall operate an OHV within the Town limits unless such minor operator has obtained, and is in constant possession of while operating an OHV, a certificate issued or authorized by the Chief of Police after the minor operator has successfully completed the SEFP.
 - b) Prior to issuance of a SEFP certificate, the minor operator or parent or responsible adult shall present each OHV to be operated by the minor operator for inspection by the Chief, or his/her designee, so that the Chief, or his/her designee, can list each OHV vehicle number for which the minor operator demonstrated proficiency and safety on the SEFP certificate.
 - c) No minor operator shall operate an OHV within the Town limits unless in possession of a SEFP certificate listing the operated OHV.
6. It is a violation of this section 10.14.030 if a person operates an OHV on a road, roadway, or alley within the limits of the Town while the operator, or another person or an animal or personal property, is riding, placed or carried on the OHV in a manner or position that reasonably interferes with the safe operation or control of the OHV, including the unobstructed view of the OHV operator.
7. Nothing in this section 10.14.030 shall be construed to authorize a violation of any provision of the Code or of any statute of the State of Colorado or of the Model Traffic Code that is in effect in the Town of Rangely.
8. The following actions will be a violation of this section 10.14.030 for any operator of an OHV within the limits of the Town of Rangely.
- a. It is a violation of this section 10.14.030 for any person to exceed a speed of fifteen (15) miles per hour within Town Limits
 - b. It is a violation of this section 10.14.030 for any person who is under the age of eighteen years to be an operator of, or a passenger on an OHV within the limits of the Town unless such operator and passenger is wearing a protective helmet commercially manufactured and designed for use by operators and passengers of motorcycles or OHVs.
 - c. Such protective helmet shall be undamaged and shall:

- I. Be made and designed to reduce injuries to the user resulting from head impacts and to protect the user by remaining on the user's head, deflecting blows, resisting penetration, and spreading the force of impact; and
- II. Consist of lining, padding and chin strap; and
- III. Meet or exceed the standards established by the U.S. Department of Transportation for motorcycle helmets as set forth in 44 C.F.R. 571.218



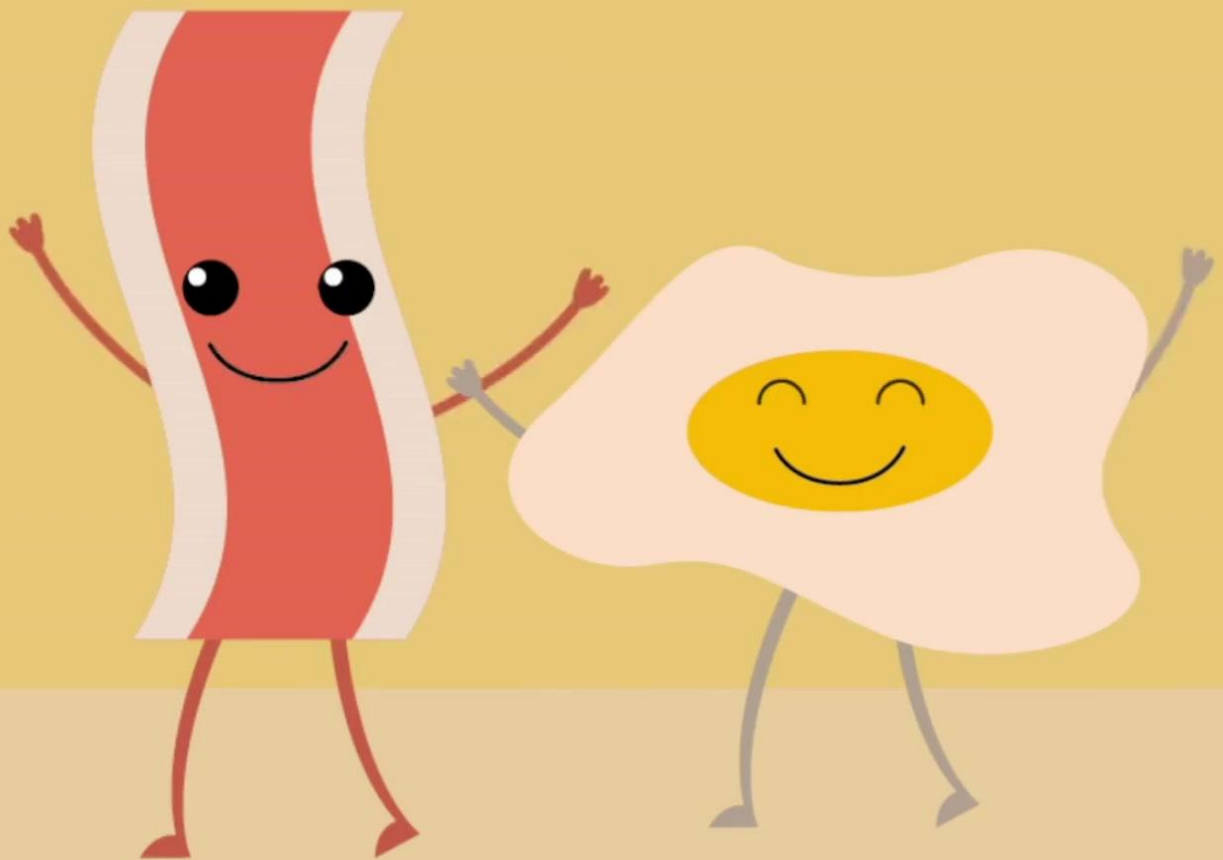

Welcome, Rangely! The Department of Local Affairs' (DOLA) Colorado Main Street Program has designated the Town of Rangely as an official Main Street community. Rangely joins 20 other cities and towns in the Colorado Main Street Program, which offers support for community-led downtown revitalization and helps communities thrive by providing a customizable framework to focus efforts, energy, and resources to create a more vibrant community.

The Town of Rangely was incorporated in 1947, although the area has been inhabited by the Fremont peoples in prehistorical times and the Ute people from historical times into the present. The first white settlers arrived in the 1880s, but the town's modern history is mostly linked to that of oil in the region. In 1931, Chevron drilled the first deep oil well in the area, but it was not until World War II, when oil was in high demand, that Rangely became a booming oil camp.

While the Rangely economy is the result of almost 80 years of dependence on oil, gas, and coal extraction, the town is looking to diversify. The community is surrounded by public lands, with 325 miles of posted and advertised OHV trails known as the Wagon West OHV Trail System. Ranching and farming still play a part in the economy, as does big game hunting and outdoor tourism. A robust broadband fiber network opens this world to remote workers.

The Colorado Main Street Program provides a framework for helping with this economic development challenge. The Colorado Main Street Program assists all of the official Main Street cities and towns in building the community engagement and support to attain their long-term visions for the future of their downtowns.

RALLY COLORADO – NATIONAL QUALITY AT A REGIONAL EVENT

Rally Colorado emphasizes the “Super” in it’s ARA Super Regional status. 38 teams descended on the small town of Rangely, Colorado for the annual event which was revived back in 2017 and joined the ARA calendar in 2019. Although dubbed as a regional, the event spanned two days and 130 stage miles worthy of challenging any national competitor and their machinery in the hot and high desert mountains. In addition to being part of the Western Regional Championship under ARA, Rally Colorado also doubles as part of the California Rally Series.

Competitors came from all over the country in this second event to run under the American Rally Associations new contact-less Covid-19 restrictions. 38 entries might not seem large, but it’s almost double what this remote event usually has and the town or Rangely welcomed them with socially distanced open arms. The Western teams were especially anxious to get back behind the wheel with this being the first event of the their season after the cancellations of Oregon Trail and the Idaho Rally as well as rescheduling of Olympus to November due to the global pandemic.

One of the most recognizable names on the entry list was that of X-Games star Bucky Lasek, returning to stage rally for the first time since working with Vermont Sportscar back in 2016, however the favorites to win had to be Dave and Mike Brown. Although they might not have the global star power of Bucky, the Brown Brothers are Colorado natives with hometown support and have claimed overall wins in 2017 and 2019. They’d have their work cut out for them this year though as their Naturally Aspirated 4WD Subaru would have to take on high performance McKenna Motorsport run Fiesta R5s driven by Martin Donnelly, Ryan Booth, and Paul Rowley. Others sporting higher

horsepower machinery and high up on the start order included the Limited 4WD and Open 4WD class entries of Travis Nease, Chris O'Driscoll, Flynn Baglin, and Mark Tabor, all with turbos and a big power advantage in the 5000+ foot mile high altitudes of the event.



"The Rally Colorado stages are definitely the most challenging in the country and just making it to the finish of the rally is a huge accomplishment. This year the event saw entries of several high end open class cars with really fast drivers behind the wheels so I knew I was a long shot for a third overall win or even a spot on the overall podium. Especially since the stages all start at over 5,000 feet and have huge elevation gains I knew the turbo cars had a huge advantage on my 2.5 L naturally aspirated motor but I wasn't going to let that stop me from going for it!" – Dave Brown

This was a write your own notes open recce rally, and for those that arrived early they had both Thursday and Friday to get them just right. For several competitors this was their first time making their own notes, which for this event would be a huge challenge. Although a mountainous region, the area is best described as high desert consisting of countless blind crests and curves that change direction with few visual references of where the road goes. As Travis Nease and Danny Norkus stated in our [Rally Colorado Preview RallyCast](#) "I've never been to an event where you had to be so on the notes before." The open recce format though was a bit of a relief to Julien Sebot driver of the #425 O.D.D. Racing Fiesta R1 "This is only my second rally...and was the first time I had blind crests and jumps, so we worked extra hard on recce. It was great that there was 2 days, as we did 3 passes on all stages and 4 on the trickiest as well as video reviews."

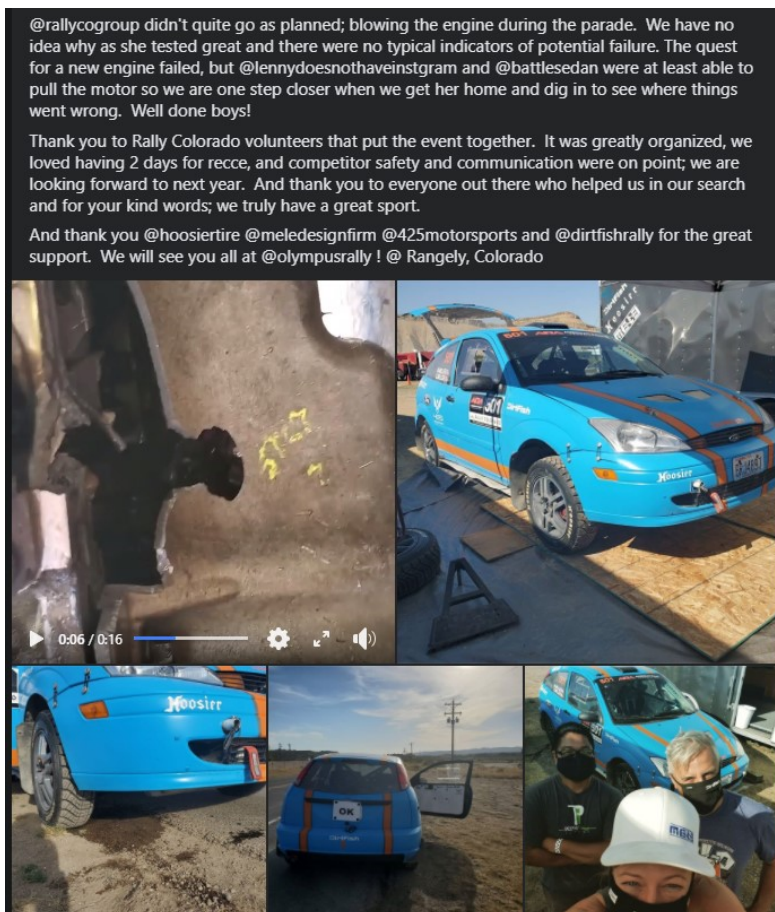
As is typical with any rally event, the weather would be a factor. With high's in the '90s the teams would be battling temperatures as much as the altitude sapping more energy from the drivers as well as the machinery. Although not humid like SOFR, the temps would still require teams to load up with water to prevent dehydration. Dust would also be a factor. The lack of trees would help as a slight breeze can quickly clear the worst of it, but just as often the dust can be blown in the direction of the road making it as bad or worse than dense fog.

With all the prep done, Friday night would normally have been time for Parc Expose with fan interaction, but with Rally Colorado being another spectator free event, Parc Expose was cancelled. Still, the town of Rangely insisted on going ahead with the annual parade of rally cars so the locals could see all the diverse machinery and wave at the competitors. Many came out to see the teams, socially distanced of course, from their parked cars, sidewalks, or front porches. Rangely loves being referred to as "Rally Town USA", and with their support of the event, it's hard to argue giving them such a title.

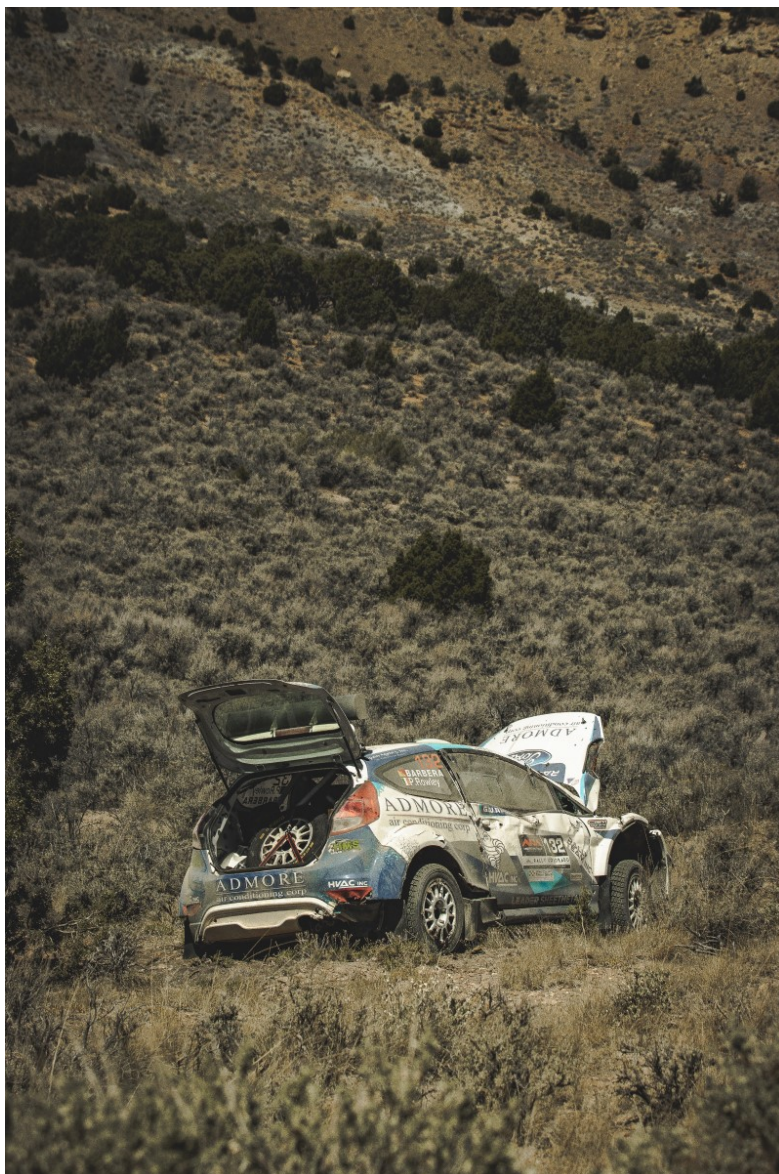
Unfortunately for Chris and Michelle Miller, the town parade was all their car could take, and their rally was over before it properly started. Michelle posted on social media "Rally Colorado didn't quite go as planned; blowing the engine during the parade. We have no idea why as she tested great and there were no typical indicators of potential failure. The quest for a new engine failed, but @lennydoesnothaveinstagram and @battlesedan were at least able to pull the motor so we are one step closer when we get her home and dig in to see where things went wrong."

The opening loop on Saturday would challenge teams with the 12 mile Valley of the Gods stage to start, followed by two 10 miles stages and the final 4 mile sprint of the Cathedral stage before only a single service for the day. At the front of the field, it was obvious who had their morning coffee as Dave Brown shot to the front on the first stage with a 25.1 second lead over our RallyCast guest Travis Nease. A trio of McKeanna Motorsport's R5s trailed behind with Paul Rowley, Ryan Booth, and Martin Donnelly 26.5, 39, and 40.5 seconds back respectively.

As the Brown Brothers predicted, their lead was going to be tough to hold as Ryan Booth and new co-driver Nick Dobbs got into their groove using the power and suspension of their top line machinery to chip away with stage win after stage win finishing the loop with a 3.5 second lead over Dave and Mike. Unfortunately the challenging long stages of the first loop would prove to be a bit too much for several teams with a combination of mechanical issues and lack of concentration catching them out. Bret Hunter and Melissa Sherowski's Zombie CRX went into limp mode, brake issues for Eliza Coleman and Rhianon Gelsomino's Scion, and Bucky Lasek and Krista Skucas broke an axle. Paul Rowley and Claudia Barbera-Pullen had an off in their Fiesta R5 causing it to roll. Although slightly shaken, both were okay thanks to the safety features in today's rally cars. In total 9 cars would suffer issues by the time they entered the first service.

Teams would then have just 45 minutes to make repairs, get a bite to eat, and re-hydrate before heading out for a repeat of the same stages. The pace increased on the second loop, but dust became more and more of an issue as the ground up dirt turned into “moon dust” that hung in the air. Being first on the road, Booth put the hammer down with his clear view ahead and although the Brown Brothers tried to stay in touch by clocking second fastest times all day long, they lost nearly two minutes to Booth’s R5 by the end of the Day. The two Martins, Donnelly and Brady in the remaining McKenna R5 kept consistent 3rd overall stage times through most of Day 1, but didn’t quite have the speed to catch Brown and Booth.

After keeping top 5 times, Travis Nease and Danny Norkus ran into fuel delivery issues causing their Mitsubishi Evo VIII to come to a stop on SS5. Michael Cadwell and Robert Maselli’s BMW 1 series suffered broken bolts with their suspension, and although Bucky got going again with penalties the second GC Subaru of the Rally Ready squad driven by Dave Carapetyan would also run into issues. By the end of the day, more than a quarter of the field would suffer issues from the challenging roads.

Day 2 would be a bit easier, but only just. This time just 3 stages instead of 4 in the two loops, but they weren’t going to be easy. It began with a repeat of the previous day’s Cathedral stage of just over 4 miles, but then the real work would kick in with the 10.8 miles Douglas Creek and 12.1 mile Dragon Trail stages. The top 3 maintained their dominance for the most part, but a brave push from rally restart Dave Carapetyan showed that he can set times with the best of them including a 3rd fastest overall on SS9 and top 4 times most of the day until the last stage where he was 6th fastest. #326 Flynn Baglin and AJ Hakala were a bit too aggressive in a tricky section on SS10 in their new to them Evo X that AJ described as a “150/kinks & !!BigCr, L2, R2.” A few cars later the #232 Subaru of Mark Tabor and Kathryn Hansen ended up in nearly the same spot, just 10 feet away. And even though there was a drivers bulletin about this section, a 3rd car, that being the #905 BMW of Peter Guagenti and Matt Rhoads also decided to join the party. Of the 38 entrants, 24 would finish the world class stages of Rally Colorado.

Overall

For the overall victory, it was a nearly perfect event for Ryan Booth and Nick Dobbs in the #689 McKenna Motorsport Fiesta R5. Although this was Nick’s first ever co-drive, they won all but one stage and finished with a lead of 6 minutes 36.3 seconds over second place with a final time of 149:48.3.

“The stages were absolutely unbelievable. They had everything from rough and technical to fast, smooth and open stages. There were some extremely sketchy spots with lots of exposure as well as a couple of really fun jumps. It is definitely one of my favorite rallies that I’ve done so far. I would love to see those stages in a national event. The town seems very in support of the rally too which was great. I had one of my high school friends, Nick Dobbs, navigate for me so the goal was just to have some fun and see if it’s something he’d like to continue doing. We both did 2 days at Team O’Neill a couple years ago when I first was entertaining the idea of starting stage rally. To say I tossed him into the deep end would be an understatement! I don’t know if there’s ever been any co-driver that has jumped straight into an R5 as their first ride! He actually did amazing for this being his first rally as well as his first time sitting in an actual race car. We’re both looking forward to Ojibwe!” – Ryan Booth

They might not have won, but Dave and Mike Brown still put on a hell of a show against exponentially more advanced machinery. Even after a controversial jump start penalty putting them a further 2 minutes behind Booth and Dobbs their performance was such that it didn’t affect their overall position. Although a bit frustrated, Dave was still happy to get such a good result

“Rally Colorado stages are definitely the most challenging in the country and just making it to the finish is a huge accomplishment. This year the event saw entries of several high end open class cars with really fast drivers, so I knew I was a long shot for a third overall win or even a spot on the overall podium. On stage 1 Mike and I dominated the competition and got the overall stage win by nearly 30 seconds despite catching some serious dust from the car in front of us. From that point forward Ryan Booth quickly began learning the Colorado terrain in his R5 and we would be second to him on every remaining stage. Ryan is a great driver and had an amazing car so he definitely deserved the win and I’m very proud to get 2nd overall against so many great competitors!” – Dave Brown

In 3rd overall were Martin Donnelly and Martin Brady in the #172 Fiesta R5 also run by McKenna Motorsport. Co-Driver Martin Brady told us that they were happy with the podium finish, especially with the added challenge of it being Donnelly's first time doing notes from scratch and their first event working together.

"It was my first time sitting with Martin in his R5, but I have known him for many years from competing against him both at home in Ireland and here in the USA, so we got on great together in the car. It was the first time in Colorado for us both and Martin made notes for the first time, so recce was a lot of work with so many stage miles to cover and a few puncture delays, but they are great stages and the two days allowed to recce was a great opportunity. We set out with the goal of finishing every mile, learning the car, and improving notes and that's what we did. Ryan and Nick were on a brilliant pace and pulling just another bit away with every stage so we became even more comfortable at our own pace. Sometimes we lost time with Martin just not trusting his notes. We would get through the corner and think it was too cautious an approach and then sometimes find the odd corner too optimistic, a common thing when you have just started making your own notes, but we had no moments and sailed around to our 3rd place finish making it three cars for the McKenna team in the top four. That was something we were all very happy about." – Martin Brady

Limited 4WD

Although not heavy on entries at only four, the Limited 4WD class had two of the fastest drivers with Travis Nease and Flynn Baglin regularly setting top 5 overall times until their events came to an early end as we noted earlier. That left the #220 DR Racing 1991 Subaru Legacy driven by Diego De Castro and co-driver Dan Quiet as well as the #730 Outback Sport of Donnie Smith and Chris Nicholls to survive to the end. Diego and Quiet put on a great effort moving up from a 21st overall at the end of the first stage to an impressive 10th overall and the Limited 4WD class win.

“This is my 3rd year running the Rally Colorado. After switching my 1991 Subaru Legacy Turbo from rallycrosser to fully stage care back in 2015. It's always been a project with friends and family since the beginning which is what makes me even more proud of what we were able to accomplish this weekend. The car is very much outmatched in the case of power and technology, with most cars being at least a decade it's junior, but there's one thing this car has that the others have struggled with... Reliability and dependability. A close friend best described it as 'bringing a knife to a nuke fight, but the knife always cuts!' Due to me not running many events, my seeding isn't ideal so we found ourselves catching competitors in the 1st loop of stages on day one. On the second loop there was confusion at regroup and a slower car regrouped out of sequence, causing a backup of 3 cars on stage 5, including ourselves. The 2 cars in front of us were able to cycle ahead but we unfortunately weren't able to. On SS 6 we caught the car about 1/4 of the way into the stage and the dust and visibility was zero. At this point it was bad enough that my co-driver ended up getting sick and we had to pull over while he recovered, losing almost 3 mins on stage. This ended up working to our advantage as we ended up with a two-minute window on SS7. We still caught heavy dust from the slower car within the last mile, but had a clean run up till then. At the end of the day we worked our way up from a 28 starting position to 16th overall and 2nd in Limited 4WD with a decent gap to 3rd.”

“Day 2 the mentality was don't bleed time and just finish. I knew how tough the stages were and how hard they were going to be on the cars. I was happy with being able to repeat a surprising second place from last year which looked possible again this year. My co-driver however had a different plan and called me out for not being on my attack game. We set out for the final loop and I pushed where possible. On the stage 10 where 3

cars ended up going off, we had our trunk rip open as a latch broke mid-stage. We were able to finish the stage and a competitor loaned us a ratchet strap so we could finish the final stages. We were celebrating a 2nd place transiting to FTC, and it was only after we pulled in to impound that Dan's wife gave us the news that we are finished 1st! It was definitely a shock as the top guys were fast, but I'm so proud of the team and the car for finishing strong. I think a lot of people forget that motorsport is a team sport as it seems drivers gets all the glory but I know we wouldn't have done all we did without all the friends and family to help us get there. So this one is for them!" – Diego De Castro

Open 2WD

Once again the Open 2WD class was going to have some of the closest competition even with the wide variety of machinery. It also had the most entries to start the event including Brad Morris' JRD Rallysport built Mirage we saw introduced at SOFR, a bevy of BMWs, a couple McKeanna Motorsport run M-Sport Fiesta R2s, a Scion XD driven by Hollywood stunt woman Eliza Coleman, and several others. The class also had what was probably the most unique entry of the event and our personal favorite, Verve Racing's 1985 Toyota Tercel that was converted from 4WD to RWD.

Unsurprisingly the Fiesta R2s got off to a strong start with the #109 of Gary Smith and Matt James leading the field, but they would have to watch their back as Brad Morris and Michael Hordijk worked to find the limits of their Mirage. Unfortunately, that limit was found on SS4 and although they returned under Rally Restart rules, the time penalties meant their chance at a podium was effectively zero. McKenna Motorsport teammates Cian McCormack and Leon Jordan in the #184 Fiesta R2 quickly moved up the overall order. At only 17 years of age, this was Cian's first rally event and he was catching cars all day, even getting class stage wins on SS6 and SS7. Unfortunately, a fuel tank problem put an end to his event on SS8, but definitely a kid to keep an eye on!

It would be the #720 BMW of Roger Matthews and Ryan Dunham, and of all things Verve Racing's #722 Tercel piloted by Steve Olona and Lauren Purkhiser that would keep Gary and Matt honest throughout the weekend. Although outclassed in hardware at the front, the "fun wheel drive" teams had their own battles to contend with. Olona and Purkhiser traded stages with the #455 BMW of Grant Hughes and Mark Malsom multiple times on day one, then on Day 2 bested Matthews and Dunham on several stage, but they were just a bit too far away to gain another podium position finishing a still impressive 3rd in class and 7th overall. 2nd in class went to Matthews and Dunham with a lead of 51.2 seconds over 3rd place.

It was however the #109 of Gary Smith and Matt James that put the hammer down and showed just how powerful the little McKenna Motorsport M-Sport Ford Fiesta R2 is with consistently top 5 and never worse than a top 7 stage times all weekend. That isn't to say that they didn't have a "moment" or two out on stage.

"The stages were unbelievable, each one had a little bit of everything: fast flowing, tight, twisty and some extremely tricky sections with big consequences. It was the 1st rally

myself and Matt James have done together. We gelled pretty well, pretty quickly. We had a good Recce and felt really comfortable with our notes so we set out to give it a good blast through the 1st loop of stages to see where the pace was at. Into 1st service, we were surprised to see we were leading the O2WD class and 6th overall. The McKenna Motorsport R2T was great through the stages. It absolutely loves corners and was great through the twisty bits. They're a fantastic little car! We had a bit of a moment on SS6, Earls Revenge, where I misheard a note on a 3 left, leading to a close call with nature; but, other than that, day 1 was pretty uneventful. We had a nice lead in O2WD going into day 2, but the nerves were starting to kick in Sunday morning. We were holding 4th overall but the gap to 5th was closing. We wanted to keep up the pace but didn't want to do anything silly either. We felt very comfortable on SS9 and the pace seemed to continue where we left off the day before. Stage 10/13 (Douglas Creek) was extremely difficult with really tricky sections at the top of the mountain. The heat was starting to take its toll on us on Stage 13, with it being over 110 degrees inside the car, so we had a lapse in concentration and had a half spin on loose gravel at a hairpin. We got back going with only a few seconds lost. Some nice cool bottles of water provided by the Marshal's at the end of the stage went down a treat. Our favorite stage was the last of the day, Dragon Trail, which was extremely fast. We had a couple of big slides and big laughs on that one. It was brilliant! NA4WD

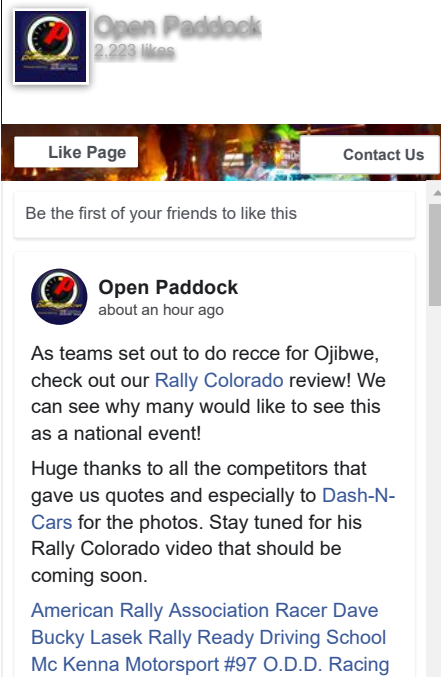

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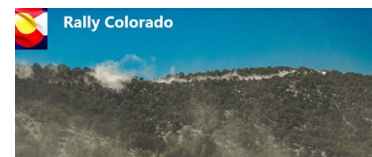

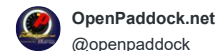
"This was the first time I had blind crests and jumps so we worked extra hard on recce. It was great that there was 2 days, as we did 3 passes on all stages and 4 on the trickiest as well as video reviews. With confidence in the notes I was able to commit on the dozens of crests. The R1 was very slow so every time I was lifting it was taking forever to get back to speed (though thankfully O.D.D. put a closer gear ratios that helped a lot). I was redlining in first gear pretty much every steep hill climb (so like a quarter of the rally!). It was awesome roads and very fun, we even got to jump the little anemic fiesta (there was a photographer so waiting for the pics! 😊) The stage where I did the best was the one with the large drops and the danger calls as it was a great equalizer. I was still mostly flat and barely ever got to use less than full throttle. We really only had one small moment on stage 13 when we understeered at low speed through a sand box into a bank, but it left not even a scratch on the car, so we took it easier for the rest of the rally as we had 5 minutes on the next competitor and were 5+ minutes behind the one in front. The car ran flawlessly, the notes were good and at the right time, we drove that fiesta all out (at least for me) nearly the whole rally. 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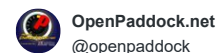
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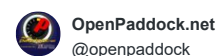

Dinosaur National Monument Reminds Hunters of Regulations

DINOSAUR, CO & JENSEN, UT – With hunting season now occurring on lands surrounding Dinosaur National Monument, hunters are reminded that hunting is not permitted in the monument. Although most of the monument boundary is well marked, hunters are responsible for ensuring they do not hunt within the monument. By knowing and understanding the rules and regulations applicable in the national monument, hunters will be better prepared to enjoy their trips.

The Lacey Act and the Code of Federal Regulations strictly prohibit the killing or removal of any animal, living or dead, and any animal parts, including shed antlers from public lands within the monument without authorization. Violators will be prosecuted and are subject to penalties including fines, jail, restitution, and the forfeiture of vehicles, equipment, and personal property associated with the violations.

Wounded wildlife that runs into the monument must be reported to law enforcement park rangers or state wildlife officers as soon as practical. To prevent waste, it is permissible to field dress a dead animal inside the monument before authorities arrive, but a living, wounded animal may not be shot inside the monument without first obtaining authorization from a law enforcement park ranger or state wildlife officer. Contact a ranger at (970) 374-3054.

Federal law allows people who can legally possess firearms under applicable federal, state, and local laws, to possess and carry firearms in Dinosaur National Monument, but discharge of firearms remains prohibited in the monument. Additional details are available on the web at <http://www.nps.gov/dino/parkmgmt/firearms-information.htm>.

Wildlife taken lawfully outside the legislative jurisdiction of the monument may be transported through the monument on park roads. The person(s) transporting the wildlife must have in their possession a valid state hunting license and, if required by state law, the animal carcasses must display a valid, properly completed game tag. Wildlife carcasses and wildlife parts being transported

within the monument are subject to inspection at any time by law enforcement park rangers or state wildlife officers. The use of ATVs and UTVs, including those licensed by a state as street legal, within the monument is prohibited.

The use of elk bugles, varmint calls, audio attractants, or other artificial or natural means of attracting or disturbing wildlife (including rattling antlers, coyote, turkey and sage grouse calls, or verbal bugling or howling imitations) are prohibited on all monument land including the right-of-way along the Harpers Corner Road. Spotlighting or use of an artificial light to view wildlife within the monument is also prohibited.

Visitors or hunters who observe illegal or suspicious activity within the monument should immediately notify park law enforcement by phone at (970) 374-3054.

Hunters are also reminded that bears are active in the area in and around the monument. Proper food storage and disposal of trash is important to protect yourself, your camp and property, and the bears.

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Colorado River District webinar to explore troubling ag land buys in the Grand Valley

Webinar seeks to answer why a New York City hedge fund is buying Grand Valley farmland.

Glenwood Springs, CO — We’ve all been wondering: why is a New York-based hedge fund buying Grand Valley farmland?

As part of the Colorado River District’s “Water With Your Lunch” webinar series and the fight to protect West Slope Water, the River District will host a discussion about Water Asset Management, the investment firm behind the agricultural land purchases that have stirred up curiosity and concern on the Western Slope.

The fifth in the Colorado River District’s lunchtime webinar series will dive into the subject from noon to 1:15 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 9. Water Asset Management founder Disque Dean has been invited to the discussion that will include Andy Mueller, the River District’s general manager, and Rep. Marc Catlin, a farmer from Montrose and state legislator representing House District 58. Catlin also sits on the River District Board of Directors.

In September 2017, a New York-based hedge fund, Water Asset Management, purchased a 330-acre farm in the Grand Valley. So began a concern that modern-day speculation in western Colorado water was underway with investors buying land not for its agricultural production but for its water – water that could net profits at some point in the future for its value outside of the Grand Valley.

Speculation in western water is not a new phenomenon. Anti-speculation doctrine is written into Colorado water law to prevent hoarding of water that does not have a specified, immediate beneficial use. Water Asset Management’s activities inspired new legislation in 2020 to study the issue. Since 2017, Water Asset Management has become the biggest shareholder in the Grand Valley Water Users Association, the entity that operates the Roller Dam in DeBeque Canyon and the Government-Highline Canal.

The Grand Valley Water Users’ water rights are for irrigation and are central to sustaining the valley’s agricultural economy. The Colorado River District was founded in 1937 to protect the water security for western Colorado. If water were to be taken from the land, the loss of economy, food production, culture and working landscapes would devastate the region.

“We do not think this is the future that our constituents or anybody else in Colorado want to see,” Mueller said. “As warming temperatures and declining river flow impact the West, the River District’s mission is to meld what science is telling us with water and economic policy-making that best protects the Colorado that we know and love. Clearly, Water Asset Management sees something in the climactic and economic trends. Our webinar will attempt to explain what is happening.”
